Board of Trustees Meeting- June 1, 2022

Willow Hall Auditorium

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM by Board President, Charles Lupo with the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENT: <u>Trustees:</u> Present were President - Charles Lupo, Vice President - Joyce Carmody, Treasurer - Eugene Murphy, Secretary - Thomas Hardman, Trustee – Louis Maiocco and Trustee - Al DAmato.

<u>Management Staff:</u> Community Manager – Joseph Schultz, Service Manager – Jim Snyder, Accounting Administrator – Michelle Lampard and Recreation Director – Mary Lighthipe.

ITEMS VOTED ON: (Continued in Community Manager's Report)

T. Hardman moved to waive the reading of the minutes. E. Murphy seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

T. Hardman moved to approve the May 4, 2022 minutes. E. Murphy seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was taken. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

J. Carmody moved to approve the replacement of carpet by Smart Carpet for the Willow Hall and Club Encore libraries for a total cost of \$2,965.00 from account #3230 – Capital Replacement/Common Buildings and to purchase furniture for the Willow Hall and Club Encore card rooms for a total cost of \$5,404.50 from account #3150 – Property Fund/Replacements. L. Maiocco seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was taken. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

A.DAmato moved to approve the purchase and construction of the outdoor grill area at Club Encore along with the needed infrastructure upgrades at a cost not to exceed \$50,000.00. This expense will be provided by account #3230 – Capital Replacement/Common Buildings. E. Murphy seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was taken. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

E. Murphy moved to approve the amendments to the LVW Bylaws Relating to the Seasoning Period for Rentals and Transfer Fees. T. Hardman seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was taken. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

L. Maiocco moved to approve the revisions to Policy Resolution regarding the Administrative Transfer Fee for Owners of LVW as amended. E. Murphy seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was taken. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

The recent rejection ballot concerning Electronic Voting and Electronic Notices; 311 ballot envelopes were received, there were 12 invalid ballots. The ballots were scanned in the presence of management and members of the election committee. A total of 270 rejection votes were needed to defeat the initiatives. The

results were 285 against electronic voting and 264 against electronic notices. The electronic voting was defeated and electronic notices was not defeated. The amendment to the LVW Bylaws concerning electronic notices has already been filed with the Ocean County Clerk.

The Board announced to reaffirm Marlene Devaney as a member of the Election Committee.

M. Lighthipe, Recreation Director, gave a report for the Recreation Department.

COMMUNITY MANAGER'S REPORT: (J. Snyder)

The two main lights in the Club Encore overflow parking lot are currently not working. There is an Electrician working to troubleshoot the problem. The irrigation well #8 located at 818 Liverpool Circle which services Condos #63 and #67 has had issues for years. Maintenance has made every attempt to fix the issue but has not been successful. Management reached out to four well companies and received two bids. Management is recommending to contract with W.B Drilling to complete the job.

T. Hardman moved to contract with W.B. Drilling Company Inc. to replace well #8 for a cost of \$6,110.00. This expense will be provided by account #3260 – Capital Replacement/Well Motors. E. Murphy seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was taken. All present were in favor. Motion carried. Phase two of the Club Encore patio was presented and the Board will continue to discuss. In order to accommodate the new Gate Entry System, there is a need to equip the Route 37 and Colonial Drive Visitor Entrance Lanes with a SunPower Vertical Pivot Gate. In order to complete the installation, there is a need to purchase one additional Vertical Gate. Management contacted the supplier, SunPower Security Gates, Inc. and have received the following quote;

- Dates pay particular attention to submitting correct dates. Date changes logged with the Recreation Department after the newspaper deadline may appear incorrectly.
- **Be consistent** for example, use Club Encore, not Encore, and Willow Hall, not Willow.
- **Page limit** Lengthy articles may be edited.
- **Deadline** submissions must be received by the first of each month for the following month's publication.

Manager's Corner

Units vs. Common Buildings



I hear the drum beat to halt the Club Encore patio refurbishment, with the plea to redirect those funds to residents' homes. I don't know how timely this article will be, as the decision may have already been made before you read this.

For background, understand that this Board, together with a few previous Boards, has met that challenge head-on. Starting only a few years ago, Trustees adopted a plan to bolster the reserves, taking on what previous Boards couldn't have had the foresight to see. They couldn't have imagined the dramatic improvement in building materials over the past few years. Instead of replacing rotted wood with more wood to be painted in an endless cycle destined to be repeated, over and over again, they looked for materials that could withstand the test of time.

This bold action has reduced labor and materials on a wasteful method and more significantly improved and benefited your home, preserving and improving the value of your home. This same philosophy has already been implemented with the window panels, fencing, Azek, and now cedar shakes.

This all comes at a high cost, funded over a shorter period of time because of the lack of foresight from the earlier Boards. They inadvertently compounded the problem by stretching the painting program out, which was thought to be satisfactory for the time but was only employed to reduce budgets in their time.

The Board's attention and the associated spending on your units dwarf what has been allocated to the community buildings, which has been discernably lacking compared to the units. Some key areas that have not been upgraded in fifty years shouldn't be acceptable to anyone.

We indeed need to focus on your homes, and I think this Board has, but it shouldn't come at the expense of the community as a whole. The Board has made the right and difficult choice to improve your home by funding those related projects, which, unfortunately, some may not see due to the enormous cost and the time it takes to get it done. However, we should invest in making the amenities more useful for the people here today and keep the Village vibrant while attracting future residents.

The common building reserve was funded to be used on the community buildings, and any expenses should go for the purpose it was intended for and shouldn't be redirected for other uses. The exterior restoration accounts are relatively new due to the lack of foresight, as mentioned before, and need sustained funding to achieve their goals. To stop a needed improvement for residents to enjoy today may be shortsighted, knowing that a one-time influx of money does so little on projects of this magnitude. I could see the argument on what enhancement choice is made for the common buildings but not to redirect the funds to the units. If you feel strongly about the pace of work to improve your unit, advocate to fund it higher or, as the ultimate fix, a special assessment where all of the units get fixed more rapidly. That decision, I'm sure, would not be acceptable to the masses and would probably elevate the costs as more contractors would be employed.

Boards have a difficult job making decisions for 3,800 residents with vastly different goals and opinions. They try to strike that delicate balance of keeping this community affordable and, at the same time, current with the future demographics of our ever-changing society.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION: Effective July 1, VISTON is requiring a minimum of 7-10 days notification to schedule drivers for doctor appointments, with a maximum of 3 per month.

Shopping will be done within 2 to 3 days of resident requests, but will be limited to ONLY once a week per resident. Unfortunately, this is due to a shortage of drivers and shoppers at the current time.

VISTON is a free service to our residents who need your help. We rely on volunteers to assist our friends and neighbors with light shopping and transportation to medical appointments. Our office lost several drivers and shoppers due to pandemic issues and we are trying to rejuvenate our list of volunteers for driving and shopping, as well as office workers.

Volunteers are valuable resources to our community. The reward a volunteer receives is the warm "loving" feeling you receive knowing you made a valuable contribution and a difference in someone's life. There is no other gift as valuable as the gift of your time to help someone in need. If we have enough volunteers, the amount of your donated time becomes minimal. Put yourselves in your neighbor's "shoes" who cannot drive. Wouldn't you be grateful for a volunteer to take you to a medical appointment or pick up a few groceries for you? Consider just a little time each month and the rewards will be great. You never know when you will need to be on the receiving end.





Simply Yoga: A Class for Every Body

Yoga's benefits include physical flexibility and strength, increased mental sharpness, and decreased anxiety and depression. What's not to love? Experience them yourself by taking Simply Yoga. Participation is free, volunteer-led, and open to all Leisure Village West residents.

We use a series of gentle poses, designed by an experienced yoga instructor. Hate those long holds, which make you feel like you're dying? Our poses are held for a maximum of six seconds. We repeat each pose several times for a deeper stretch without straining.

Those with physical challenges can make their own adaptations. A chair can help you balance, or get down or up from the floor. Yoga knee pads or a thicker mat can cushion you, as can a small pillow for under your knees or neck. Worried you're not "fit enough?" We come in all shapes, sizes, and levels of fitness. The more regularly you attend, the more your fitness will slowly improve.

After the poses, there's a short period of relaxation, during which body and mind are gently coaxed into stillness. This integrates the practice, resulting in a feeling of grounded, peaceful awareness.





Monarchs Rule ... and Something Fishy



At our April 25 meeting, the Nature Club featured an impressive program on the well-loved Monarch Butterfly. As I was unable to attend, Club President, Greg Prelich, compounding his other duties, volunteered his services as amanuensis. As evidenced by the following, Greg was clearly the man for the job.

The Monarch people (Charlie and Karen Gartlan, from Leisure Knoll) were pretty good. Nice slides. They got lured into raising butterflies in their home in the same way that other people have, by finding Monarch caterpillars on their parsley and dill, hearing about their reliance on milkweed as a food source ... and then it all takes over. The Gartlans gave a nice human aspect to it: how Karen canceled going to meetings because the caterpillars were hatching out that day; showing a video clip of releasing them outside; telling how they would bring them over to people who were sick or just lost a loved one and letting them release the butterflies, etc. They talked about the migration, too, and challenges to their survival. All good.

Then they played another video from a DVD that showed the clouds of Monarch Butterflies in the mountains of Mexico, captivating the attendees with one of nature's most dazzling sights!

At the beginning of the video, Karen put on her Monarch shawl, which was actually kind of cool, and 44 • *Leisure Village West News* • August, 2022 drew an appropriate response from the appreciative crowd. (See photo.) They brought all kinds of goodies for people to examine (a dried Swallowtail, empty chrysalises, milkweed cuttings, and more).

• Some fascinating factoids: It takes ~30 days to go from an egg to a flying adult monarch.

• The "Methuselah generation" that leaves New Jersey (and other locations in the U.S.) in the fall fly all the way to Mexico, living up to 9 months.

• In sharp contrast, on the way northward in the spring, they go through 3–4 generations, each living only 2–4 weeks maximum, before that last generation heads all the way to Mexico in one monumental trip in the fall again—even though their grandparents and great-grand-butterfly parents and their traveling companions had never seen Mexico. Amazing!



There was a very good crowd of 84 people, back to where we were in pre-Covid times.

Faithful readers of this column might recall my article on "birdbrains," where multiple species of birds exhibited genuine acumen in solving complicated tests and puzzles. Herewith is another example, even more remarkable, of nonmammalian species demonstrating

unexpected cognitive abilities.

As published in the journal, Scientific Reports, researchers at the University of Bonn have shown that certain species of fish, namely cichlids and stingrays, can—with a high degree of accuracy—distinguish between three items and four items, and can be trained to do so. In fact, both fish have the capacity to perform simple arithmetic, increasing or decreasing a given value by one.

The cohort of cichlids and stingrays were shown a series of geometric shapes: squares, circles, triangles, among other shapes, colored blue or yellow, in different combinations at different times. The fish soon recognized that blue signaled "add one" item, whereas yellow conveyed the need to "subtract one." In each instance, the fish involved were virtually infallible in their calculations—despite the fact they lack a cerebral cortex, the part of the brain that enables us humans to perform convoluted cognitive tasks.

The Nature Club next meets on Monday, August 22, at 7 pm, Willow Hall. Our featured speaker will be Russell Juelg, Senior Land Steward for New Jersey Conservation Foundation, whose program on the trees of South Jersey will be sure to entertain and enlighten.


