# **Board of Trustees Meeting- May 3, 2023**

# Willow Hall Auditorium

The meeting was called to order at 1:07 PM by Board President, Charles Lupo with the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENT: <u>Trustees</u>: Present were Board President - Charles Lupo, Vice President - Joyce Carmody, Treasurer - Eugene Murphy, Board Secretary - Thomas Hardman, Trustee - Wayne Steinman, Trustee – Michael Blank and Trustee - Fay Weinstein.

<u>Management Staff</u>: Present were Community Manager – Jim Snyder, Accounting Administrator – Michelle Lampard and Recreation Director – Mary Lighthipe. Also present was Michael Polulak from McGovern Legal Services.

<u>APPEARANCES</u>: Melissa DePalma from Manchester Township Senior Services spoke about the different services and programs available to those individuals over the age of 60 years old.

C. Lupo stated the Board responded to allegations made by a resident at the April 5<sup>th</sup> open Board meeting through the Association's Attorney.

### FIRST ORDER OF BUSINESS:

Trustee Violation statement read by T. Hardman: All Trustees of Leisure Village West agree to abide by a Trustee Code of Conduct- Regarding Board Member's Conduct and Confidentiality. Trustee, J. Carmody has been charged with violating The Trustee Code of Conduct for disclosing information regarding upcoming contract negotiation strategies that the Association will be entering. Board Members shall not disclose *Information related to pending or anticipated litigation or contract negotiations*. Trustee J. Carmody denied this claim and presented an email in an effort to support her position. Trustee J. Carmody has asked for the charge to be dismissed. This is Trustee J. Carmody's second formal warning regarding breaching the Trustee Code of Conduct. A third violation by Trustee J. Carmody would result in the President of the Board of Trustees recommending the Board vote to initiate the removal process of Trustee J. Carmody at the Open Meeting of the Trustees.

### ITEMS VOTED ON: (continued in "Community Manager's Report)

T. Hardman moved to waive the reading of the minutes. W. Steinman seconded. All were in favor. Motion carried.

T. Hardman moved to approve the April 5, 2023 minutes. E. Murphy seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was called. All were in favor. Motion carried.

F. Weinstein moved to approve the new Policy Resolution regarding Private Resident to Resident Lessons for a Fee on Common Elements. W. Steinman seconded. There was a comment from the audience and a vote was then called. All were in favor. Motion carried.

M. Blank moved to approve the purchase of 14 stacking armchairs for use in Willow Hall, Club Encore, and Leisure Fair from Worthington Direct at a cost of \$2,372.40. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3150 – Property Fund. F. Weinstein seconded. There were comments from the audience and a vote was then called. All were in favor. Motion carried.

E. Murphy moved to approve the revisions to the Alternate Dispute Resolution (ADR) Charter. F. Weinstein seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was called. All were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo stated that the new Trustee Liaison for the Community Services Committee is M. Blank.

M. Lighthipe gave a report for Recreation.

### COMMUNITY MANAGER'S REPORT: (J. Snyder)

On March 1, 2023, Management presented the Board with a recommendation to purchase three (3) pumps and motors and was approved by the Board on April 5, 2023. Unfortunately, by the time the order could be placed, there was a price increase from when it was originally quoted. W.B. Drilling's original quote was \$9,185.33 and has increased to \$10,470.42. Management did contact the companies who originally submitted bids. Zoro is out of stock and Grainger cost is \$11,677.71. Management is recommending to rescind the previously approved motion from April 5, and approve the purchase of three (3) pump and motors from W.B. Drilling at a cost of \$10,470.42. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3260 – Capital Replacement/Irrigation-Well Motors. *E. Murphy moved to rescind the motion from April 5<sup>th</sup> and approve to purchase the three (3) pump and motors from W.B. Drilling for a total cost of \$10,470.42. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3260 – Capital Replacement/Irrigation-Well Motors. <i>T. Hardman seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was called. All were in favor. Motion carried.* 

As you are aware, the United States Postal Service (USPS) will no longer replace cluster mailboxes. It is now the community's responsibility to replace these boxes at the Association's expense. There has become a need to move forward and replace two mailboxes that are in very poor condition. Management went out to bid to obtain the costs associated with purchasing two (2) 16 mail-slot cluster boxes. The following is the pricing received with tax and shipping included;

Management is requesting Board approval to purchase two (2) 16 box cluster mailboxes from National Mailboxes for a total cost of \$4,285.15. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3230 – Capital Replacement/ Common Buildings. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on June 7, 2023.

Part of the approved Azek project is replacing the unit's gutter system with new 6" gutters and replacement leaders. During this year's cycle, the Association will be replacing the gutter systems on 50 units. The average cost per unit is \$800.00. Management is requesting Board approval to replace the gutter system on fifty (50) Azek units for a cost of \$40,000.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3270 – Capital Replacement/Roofs. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on June 7, 2023.

UPS has tentatively approved to place a drop box in the Village for residents only. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on June 7, 2023.

Updates were provided on the Willow Pergola replacement and the Club Encore pool renovation.

The Bocce courts will begin in September.

Residents should report any damage to their units to the Maintenance Department. Insurance claims could be denied for neglect if not reported in a timely manner to the Association.

For the Village to comply with HUD's regulatory requirements for the age verification of residents, the Association is requesting all residents to fill out the age verification form that is posted on Frontsteps and available at the Association office.

The Club Encore kitchen is being installed.

Part of the original plan to renovate the Club Encore patio is to replace the patio furniture. A sub-committee was made up to develop the furniture needs for the patio. With that plan in mind, Management went out to bid for the table and chairs needed for the patio. These are in a two-tier category based on the quality of the furniture.

Management is recommending to purchase the tier-one quality furniture from The Wickery for a cost of \$48,365.10. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3150 – Property Fund. Upon recommendation from Management, *F. Weinstein moved to approve the purchase of the tier-one quality furniture from The Wickery for a cost of* \$48,365.10. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3150 – Property Fund. E. Murphy seconded. There was a resident comment and then a vote was called. All were in favor. Motion carried.

Parking violations continue in the Village. There is no parking permitted on any LVW street during the hours of 2 a.m. to 6 a.m. except where 72 hours parking signs are posted. The Association will continue to ticket vehicles parked overnight on the street between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m.

Permits are required for many changes a unit owner wishes to make. There is no charge for these permits which may be obtained at the Association Office.

Pet owners must always maintain full control of the animal. The animal must always be leashed while outside of the unit. Owners are responsible for removing their pet's wastes from the common elements and units and are to place the wastes in their own garbage receptacle, not in any public receptacle or storm drain. Droppings must be picked up immediately and put into the owners' own receptacle containers. Pets must be walked in the streets (at the curb) and in such open or wooded areas not used for recreational purposes or parking facilities, or in common areas. Any pet violation will result in a \$250.00 fine.

There are four HVAC units at Leisure Fair. The first two units were replaced two years ago as phase one of the replacement plan. There is a need to replace the remaining two HVAC units. The following bids were received:

Buildings. Upon recommendation from Management, F. Weinstein moved to contract with Renegade Mechanical LLC to install two (2) new Coleman HVAC units at Leisure Fair for a cost of \$23,031.00 and Manchester Township permits for a cost of \$400.00, for a total cost of \$23,431.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3230 – Capital Replacement/Common Buildings. T. Hardman seconded. There was no discussion and a vote was called. All were in favor. Motion carried.

H. Height, I.T Facilities Manager stated that the Maintenance Department must frequently diagnose underground wire breaks and broken water lines around the community and residential units. Maintenance is currently using some old and outdated detection equipment for finding some of these breaks; however, the equipment is not capable of finding many of these breaks and is due for replacement. On several occasions, Maintenance has had to call in outside companies to aid in the location of breaks. This has proven to be very expensive. Management believes it would be most cost-effective to have the same equipment these companies are using in-house, so they can diagnose and fix the problems more quickly and cost-effectively. The detection unit most used in this industry is the Radiodetection RD7200. Management had a dealer representative onsite recently to demonstrate this unit. The results were outstanding, so Management went out to bid and the bids are listed below: (quotes include tax and shipping)

Management is recommending to purchase the Radiodetection RD7200 locator kit from Eastcom Associates Inc. for a total cost of \$5,049.76. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3150 - Property Fund. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on June 7, 2023.

The Board requested that Management research pricing for an ADA Chair Lift for the Willow pool. Management reached out to Millennial Pool Management for their recommendation. They are recommending an SR Smith 400 lb. capacity chair lift. Management reviewed this model as well as other brands of lift chairs. Also considered were portable models. After reviewing all options, the SR Smith offers the best mobility, safety, and ease of use. Management is recommending contracting with Millennial Pool Management for the purchase and installation of an SR Smith 400 lb. capacity pool lift.

### 2024 BUDGET

Dear Fellow Unit Owners:

We cordially invite you to participate in the general meeting of unit owners that will be held at 7:00pm on Wednesday, July 26, 2023 in Willow Hall. At the meeting, we will present the budget for next year. Please email any budget-related questions to <u>association@lvwa.net</u> by Friday, July 14, 2023. A live broadcast will be shown on Channel 974. The meeting will also be recorded and played at a later time.

The proposed budget reflects a \$20.00 increase per unit per month. This increase is necessary to maintain the level of services and protect the common elements of our community and is being applied to the budget as follows:

Reserve Fund Budget Increase	\$	4.58
Operating Fund Budget Increase	_	15.42
Increase Per Unit Per Month	\$	20.00

The notable increases to the budget are as follows:

- Increase of \$140,000 to the Roof reserve fund due to increasing market prices of materials.
- Increase of \$109,900 to Insurance Expense due to higher premiums over the prior year and an increase in the coverage limits.
- Increase of \$103,400 to Community Cable Expense due to increase in contracted rates.
- Increase of \$32,300 to Gatehouse Entry Expense due to increase in contracted rates.
- Increase of \$20,100 to Professional Fees Legal Expense due to increased legal fees related to Association litigation issues.
- Increase of \$19,500 to Fuel Machinery & Equipment due to increasing fuel costs.
- Increase of \$15,400 to Fertilizer Expense to continue the new lawn renovation program.

The first payment for the new fiscal year is due October 1, 2023. Maintenance payments paid in full for the fiscal year **and** by the October 2023 due date will be eligible for a 2% refund. Please deduct the 2% refund from your payment - Page 9 lists the amount to pay for the full year after the refund by model/number of occupants.

LVWA also offers an automatic payment plan for the payment of your monthly maintenance fees. If you do not already participate in automatic payment, please go to <a href="https://propertypay.cit.com">https://propertypay.cit.com</a> to sign up with the following information:





- July 2023 Special Edition: Leisure Village West News mailed to residents containing candidate(s) profile(s).
- July 3, 2023 6 p.m. EDST Candidates Orientation Willow Hall.
- July 7, 2023 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. EDST Candidates Meet and Greet Willow Hall.
- July 21, 2023 7 p.m. EDST Candidates Forum Willow Hall.
- July 28, 2023 Absentee Ballots mailed to owners/residents by this date.
- August 10, 2023 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. EDST Candidates Meet and Greet Club Encore.
- August 31, 2023 1 p.m. EDST Last minute ballots and proxy withdrawals accepted with proper ID, immediately followed by the Annual Meeting of the Members. If quorum is met, annual meeting will be suspended and ballots will be open and tallied. If there is no quorum, the annual meeting will be suspended for 30 days.

# Audience Comments - May 3, 2023

# Willow Hall Auditorium

A brief audience comments period followed the business portion of the open Board meeting at 3:35 PM with residents raising questions or concerns or seeking clarification about a variety of issues. For exact content, please refer to Frontsteps for the video recording of this meeting.

The following Rules of Public Comment and Participation in the Open Forum were revised as follows;

- In general, residents' questions and comments should be addressed to the interest of all residents. For resolution of personal or maintenance issues, contact the Department Manager and, if necessary, the Community Manager.
- The Open Forum is not a debating time or a time to cross-examine our neighbors serving as Trustees.
- This is an opportunity for residents to be heard but everyone is to stay civil and use respectful language while also avoiding personal attacks.
- The Open Forum will be limited to one hour but may end sooner if only a few residents address the Board.
- Residents must be present at the meeting to make a comment or ask a question and will be allowed three minutes to do so. There will be a two-minute comment or answer, if necessary, from the Board of Trustees and a one-minute follow-up question allowed by the resident.
- Maximum two times at the podium.

If a resident was unable to ask a question or make a comment, the Board may be emailed at bot@lvwa. net. Emails will be reviewed at a Board of Trustee workshop meeting. Statements and opinions of Villagewide significance will periodically be addressed at an Open Board of Trustee Meeting and/or in the Manager's Corner of the LVW News Magazine.

Resident: Patricia Tracy from 657B Pulham Court solicited volunteers for the Audio-Visual Group.

<u>Resident:</u> Margaret Burke from 1060A Buckingham Drive asked if the Willow pool will be heated when it is open.

Response: Yes, the pool will be heated.

<u>Resident:</u> Gail Lupo from 1238A Thornbury Lane spoke about how the Board meetings are proceeding in a way that is not business and provided suggestions on how to move forward.

<u>Resident:</u> Nancy Krahn from 1138B Thornbury Lane stated she believes it's safer to have lifeguards at the pool. She asked why card playing is not allowed in the coffee lounge, especially if the rest of the rooms are being used. She questioned the high prices for the snacks and drinks in the vending machines.

<u>Response:</u> The Board opted to be exempt from having lifeguards at the pool. The coffee lounge is not for playing card games and is meant for a gathering place. The costs for the items in the vending machines are set by the contractor of the vending machine.

<u>Resident:</u> Al DAmato from 697B Friar Court complimented the Grounds Manager for the conversion of the dump truck.

<u>Resident:</u> Phyllis Brown from 1195A Thornbury Lane asked if the attorney will be attending all the Board meetings since the Association is involved in litigation. She asked what the hourly rate is that the attorney is paid.

<u>Response:</u> No, the attorney will not be present at every open Board meeting, only when deemed necessary. Upon written request, all contracts in the Association office are available for review.

<u>Resident:</u> Ron Owens from 1145A Thornbury Lane announced that the Greenhouse closed on Friday and thanked Joseph Piscitelli for his hard work. He also encouraged residents to attend the memorial service program on Memorial Day at Club Encore.

She asked why residents are not allowed to know the salaries of employees. She spoke about voting by the Board members.

<u>Response:</u> The Board follows what is required by the Condominium Act and they discuss a handful of issues that are confidential, such as private issues (ADA requests, service animals, etc.), employee-related issues, negotiating contracts and pending litigation. Financial expenditures are voted on at open Board meetings. The line item for the employees is found in the financials, but the actual employee files of what individuals are being paid is confidential. Board members can vote any way they wish, but once the Board makes a decision, it should be supported by the entire Board.

<u>Resident:</u> Joseph O'Neill from 937C Liverpool Circle asked how many accounts the Association has. He asked why the Association requires permits for electrical, plumbing, etc. if the Township requires one and has already inspected the work.

<u>Response:</u> There are several Reserve accounts and many accounts within the operating account. The Association permits make sure that the contractor is insured, Manchester Township permits were issued and other requirements permitted by the Association.

<u>Resident:</u> Dorothy Miller from 9B Cambridge Circle asked for clarification that Clubs are allowed four fundraisers and that the committee is looking to revise it to two fundraisers. She stated the chairs in the lobby at Club Encore need rubber feet.

<u>Response:</u> The committee is reviewing the Rules Governing Clubs and Groups. The Recreation Director will address the chairs at Club Encore.

<u>Resident:</u> Gail Dylewski from 908A Stratford Court spoke about the importance of getting permits from the Association.

<u>Resident:</u> John Joyce from 9B Cambridge Circle reported that the lights flicker in the auditorium at Willow Hall during the Board meeting.

Response: Management will address.

The meeting ended at approximately 4:07 PM.

Coverage is written on a "Special Perils" basis meaning that all perils are covered except those specifically excluded such as (but not limited to) Flood, Earthquake, Nuclear Accidents, and War. (Additional coverage may have been purchased to delete one or more of these exclusions.)

While very broad in scope, the association's master policy is not intended to cover personal property, loss of use (temporary rental assistance), loss assessment, upgrades or improvements made by any unitowners (past or present), or their personal liability. In light of this, it is highly recommended that each owner and/or tenant consult with their insurance professional and provide them with the above information when determining their personal insurance needs. Portable Gas Grill NJ State Law requires that gas grills must be at least 10 feet away from the unit, and propane tanks are not to be stored within the unit or in the garage at any time.

*Gas Grill* Propane or Natural Gas grills must be at least 10 feet away from a unit wall and fence (NJ State Law). The grill must be placed on a solid base. Extra propane tanks must be placed adjacent to the grill within the parameters stated above. **Propane tanks must not be stored** 

in the garage or in the unit. A storage area for propane tanks is available in the Maintenance Yard. Smoker grills and charcoal grills are prohibited. No grill may be stored and used next to a unit or vinyl fence.

Youth guests under 4 years of age are not permitted in either pool. Children in strollers under the age of four will be allowed in the pool area only during children's swim hours.

In the event of the closing of one pool; the youth guest hours are as follows at the opened pool - 11am to 1pm and 4pm to 7pm. A 20-minute grace period will be allowed for children to exit the pool area at the end of the children's swim hours. Children are not allowed in the pool area at any time other than designated youth hours. Children must be supervised by a parent or grandparent at all times when in the pool and pool area.

Unsupervised children will be asked to leave the pool. Roughhousing and horseplay will not be tolerated.

### POOL ENTRY:

Members must swipe their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the pool gate in order to obtain admittance to the pool area.

- **GUESTS:** Up to (4) adult or youth guests are permitted and MUST be accompanied by a RESIDENT who must REMAIN with guests at all times.
- ATTIRE: Proper swim attire must be worn from home to pool since the changing area is limited. Cut-off jeans are not allowed in the pool. A cover-up wrap is needed when entering the clubhouses. The Association is not responsible for any damage to bathing suits due to pool chemicals. Street shoes are not allowed in the pool. DO NOT LEAVE SHOES OR SLIPPERS AT THE POOL STEPS.
- **DIAPERS:** Only diapers specially designed for immersion in water are permitted.
- **SAFETY:** NO DIVING OR JUMPING IS ALLOWED AT EITHER POOL AND WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. NO SITTING OR STANDING ON POOL STEPS UNLESS WHERE INDICATED AT THE ENCORE POOL. Weather-related closures are at the discretion of the CPO or LVW management. The CPO or LVW management will determine when to reopen the pool. CPO does remain on duty during rain.
- SWIM AIDS: NO floats, toy surfboards or swim toys are permitted in the pool with the exception of noodles.- Noodles are not to exceed two per person. Mesh seat noodles are also acceptable. Swimsuits that incorporate a flotation device as part of the suit construction along with swimmies are allowed. . Residents are permitted to use therapeutic aquatic belts or Coast Guard approved life vests.

# HEALTH: PERSONS WITH OPEN WOUNDS ARE NOT PERMITTED IN EITHER POOL OR JACUZZI AT ANY TIME.

- FOOD: Food and beverages are permitted in the pool area. NO GLASS OR OTHER SIMILAR CONTAINERS THAT MIGHT CAUSE PERSONAL INJURIES IF BROKEN ARE PERMITTED IN THE POOL AREAS. NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE PERMITTED IN THE POOL AREAS. Tables and surrounding area are to be left clean.
- **SMOKING:** Neither smoking nor vaping are permitted within 25ft of the pool area. Please use designated areas.
- **LOUNGES**, Lounges, chairs or tables are not to be reserved.

CHAIRS, TABLES: When leaving the pool area chairs and lounges are to be returned to their proper places.

- **SHOWERS:** Bathers are required to shower before entering the pools. If water shoes are worn please rinse before entering the pool.
- JACUZZI: Residents are to read and follow rules posted at the Jacuzzi. No one under the age of 16 is allowed in the Jacuzzi.
- **MUSIC:** Please use headphones where possible, otherwise be considerate and keep the volume down as not to disturb fellow members.

All rules and regulations will be strictly enforced and are subject to change.





#### Homogenize Milk, Not Birds

Though uniqueness is often a quality that garners admiration, in the avian world, it now appears that ordinariness is a supreme gift.

As reported in the journals Science and Current Biology, two separate studies show that many bird species, whose extraordinary adaptations make them essential to their respective ecosystems, appear because of their uniqueness—to be targeted for extinction.

Few birds are as unique as the toucan, that highly conspicuous denizen of the South American rainforest. With its singular beak, toucans are enabled to feed on fruit that is either too large or too unyielding for other birds. The myriad seeds from the toucans' diet are then dispersed throughout the toucans' range, which adds crucial diversity to an increasingly fragile ecosystem.



Researchers at the University of Sheffield spent years comparing beak size and shape, limb and wing length, and overall dimensions of 8500 specimens representing birds from around the world. A database showing trait similarities and disparities was then developed from these metrics. For the sake of practicality, birds already deemed most vulnerable to extinction by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature were removed from consideration. As findings were mathematized from most to least threatened, toucans, hornbills, hummingbirds, and miscellaneous other demonstrably



distinct birds emerged as the most likely to go extinct. Birds of similar shapes and sizes (e.g., sparrows, finches, starlings) were proven less likely to disappear. (Pigeons, no doubt, will live on forever!)

Fourteen major biomes (crucial habitats such as flooded grasslands and tropical forests), where birds are believed to be at particular risk, were assiduously studied. Twelve of the fourteen, which include southern Vietnam, Cambodia, the Himalayan foothills, and the Hawaiian Islands (which have already lost their emblematic honeycreepers) were deemed most vulnerable to species homogenization, where numerous birds recognized for their distinctive traits¬—and indispensable contributions to the ecosystems of which they are a part¬—will presumably cease to exist.

Using foundational data on the 9882 bird species described by BirdLife International, scientists at the Senckenberg Biodiversity and Climate Research Centre conducted a separate study (published in the Proceedings of the Royal Society B.) that showed how climatic upheaval is set to dramatically alter birds' ranges on a global basis. Parts of North America and Eurasia are projected to gain species as birds flee their homes in the tropics that have become unlivable due to climate warming. Such population shifts become problematic when these new arrivals impinge upon indigenous species that are already well-established. Having evolved similar traits and behaviors, these newcomers, through species homogenization, are

liable to disrupt local ecosystems in various and unpredictable ways. One of these projected contests will feature the Collared Flycatcher (Ficedula albicollis), a species primarily of southeastern Europe, versus the Pied Flycatcher (F. hypoleuca), which is firmly established in northeastern Europe. As the Collared tribe moves inexorably northward into Pied territory, the stage will be set for the avian version of West Side Story!

All interested parties would be wise to arrive on **Monday, July 24 at 7 p.m.**, Willow Hall for one of the Nature Club's famous live animal presentations. Josh Gant, outreach naturalist from Wells Mills County Park in Waretown, NJ, will deliver his program on owls—those superbly adapted raptors of the night so renowned in lore and legend.

## Book Discussion Club

I am really excited about this biography, *Woman* of No Importance, by Sonia Purnell. As an amputee myself, I stand in awe of Virginia Hall, this intelligent, brave, persevering woman, who, despite wearing a prosthesis that was nowhere near the lovely, wellfitting one that I rely on, ran several operations for the English with the French Resistance in WWII.

Chosen as a BEST BOOK OF THE YEAR by NPR, the New York Public Library, Amazon, the Seattle Times, the Washington Independent Review of Books, the Spectator, and the Times of London, and Winner of the Plutarch Award for Best Biography, this book is the never-before-told story of Virginia Hall, the American spy who changed the course of World War II.

In 1942, the Gestapo sent out an urgent transmission: "She is the most dangerous of all Allied spies. We must find and destroy her."

The target in their sights was Virginia Hall, a Baltimore socialite who talked her way into Special Operations Executive, the spy organization dubbed Winston Churchill's "Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare." She became the first Allied woman deployed behind enemy lines and—despite her prosthetic leg and being an American operating for the English helped to light the flame of the French Resistance, revolutionizing secret warfare as we know it.

Virginia established vast spy networks throughout France, called weapons and explosives down from the skies, and became a linchpin for the Resistance. Even as her face covered wanted posters and a bounty was placed on her head, Virginia refused order after order to evacuate. She finally escaped through a deathdefying hike over the Pyrenees into Spain, her cover blown. But she plunged back in, adamant that she had more lives to save, and led a victorious guerilla campaign, liberating swathes of France from the Nazis after D-Day.

Based on new and extensive research, Sonia Purnell has, for the first time, uncovered the full secret life of Virginia Hall—an astounding and inspiring story of heroism, spycraft, resistance, and personal triumph over shocking adversity. 
