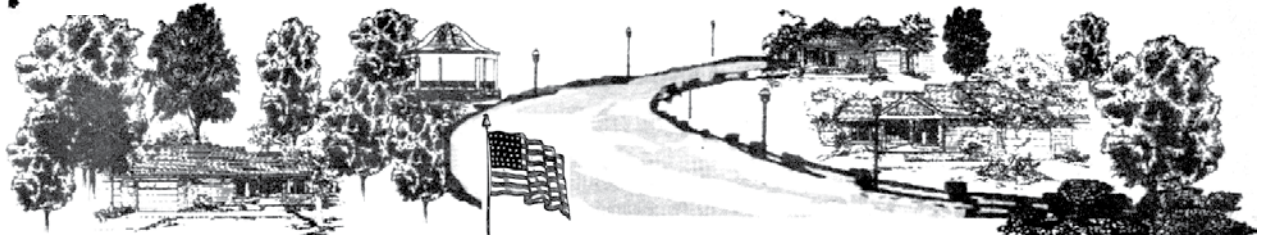

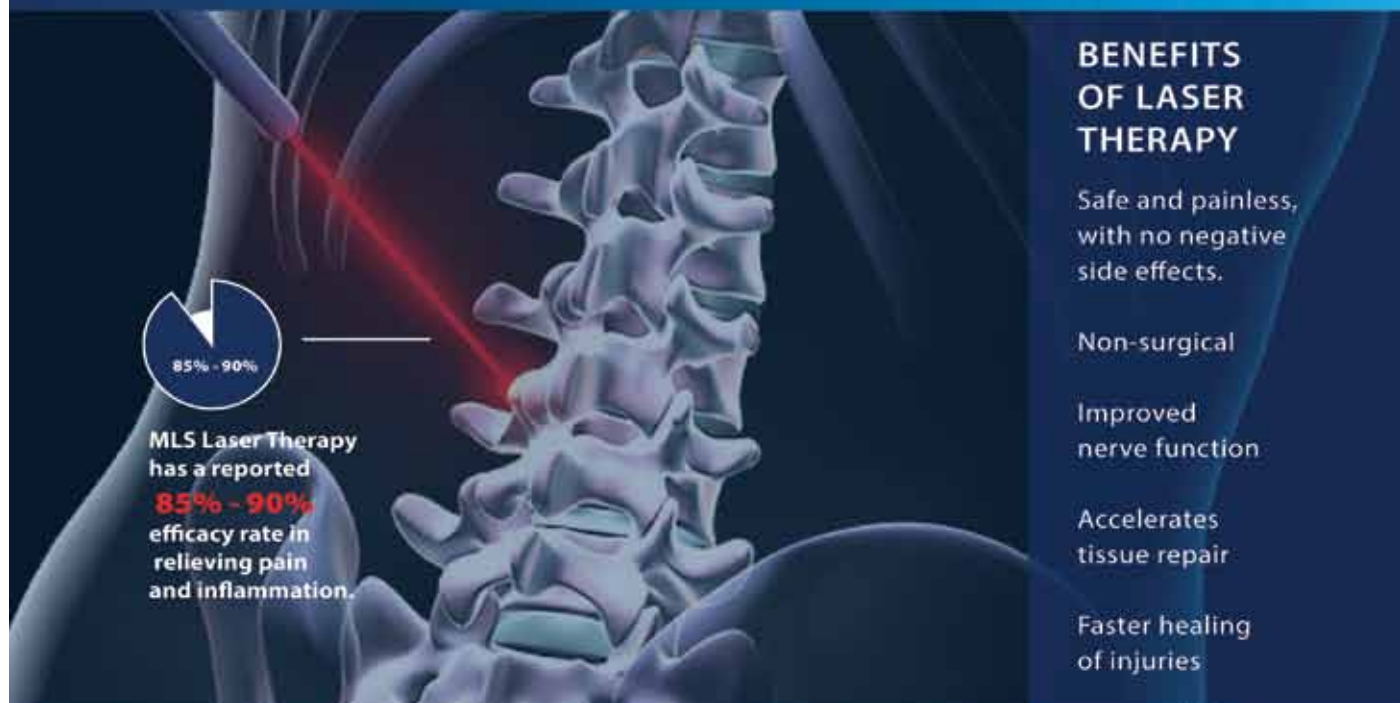

Board of Trustees Meeting – June 6, 2018

Present were S. Tozzi, C. Lupo, L. Maiocco, S. Falk-Zitelli and F. Weinstein. Also present were Community Manager J. Schultz, Service Manager J. Snyder, Accounting Administrator M. O'Connor and Recreation Manager Mary Lighthipe. S. Kaufman was absent.

This meeting commenced at approximately 1 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

S. Tozzi informed residents that there will be a meeting with Verizon representatives on Thursday, June 14, 2018 at 7 p.m. in Willow Hall.

S. Falk-Zitelli moved to waive the reading of the minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

L. Maiocco moved to approve the May 16, 2018 minutes. S. Falk-Zitelli seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

F. Weinstein moved to approve the Fiduciary Duties, Responsibilities and Code of Conduct Policy. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo moved to extend the Ridge Realty lease for 3A Buckingham Drive for three additional years with two one-year options, beginning on January 1, 2019, with an annual increase of 5% for each year. L. Maiocco seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

Community Manager's Report

Community Manager J. Schultz stated the waste contract is coming due at the end of the year. The contract and the RFP are with the attorney and once we get it back it will go out for bid.

Service Manager J. Snyder discussed purchasing radar speed limit signs that

can be placed in many different locations along the roadways. He went out to bid to 4 vendors and has presented it to the BOT. No decision was made.

Service Manager J. Snyder stated the exterminating contract with Central Termite and Pest Control will expire on September 30, 2018. He went out for bid and recommended to contract with Viking Pest Control for a total of \$208,985.00 with a 7 year contract, for a savings of \$267,277.36 over a 7 year period as opposed to Central Termite and Pest Control who came in at \$476,262.36 for 7 years. The reason for the 7 year contract is so that a preventative termite treatment can be done at every home, 1/7th of the village will be done every year. This will be voted on at the June 20, 2018 meeting.

Service Manager J. Snyder stated he has been in contact with the engineering company, Global Hydro, Inc., to determine if it was possible to get the well water allocations from the DEP adjusted to meet the needs of the Village. He recommended that we contract with Global Hydro Inc. to proceed with the initial work needed at cost of \$7,970.00. This expense will be charged to GL #3260 Capital Replacement-Irrigation/Well Motors Fund.

Community Manager J. Schultz reminded residents that Martin Lynch, the Township Tax Assessor, will be at the June 20, 2018 meeting at 1 p.m. to discuss the re-assessment process with residents.

Mary Lighthipe gave the Recreation Report.

The business meeting was adjourned at 1:54 p.m.

Board of Trustees Meeting – June 20, 2018

Present were S. Tozzi, C. Lupo, S. Falk-Zitelli, S. Kaufman and F. Weinstein. Also present were Community Manager J. Schultz, Service Manager J. Snyder, Accounting Administrator M. O'Connor and Recreation Manager Mary Lighthipe. L. Maiocco was present on speakerphone.

This meeting commenced at approximately 1 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Martin Lynch, Manchester Twp. Tax Assessor, reviewed the re-assessment process with residents. He informed residents that the process will be begin the last week of July and continue through August & September. He stated that the employees will have photo ID, wear a Township shirt, drive a Township vehicle and have a tablet with them. They will knock on the door and leave a door hanger if the resident is not home. A letter will be sent out in October or November of 2019 informing residents of any changes in taxes for the year 2020. Residents who may qualify for the Property Tax Reimbursement program can call 1-800-882-6597 for more information. There are also two (2) other deduction programs available through the Tax Assessors' office: Local Property Tax Deduction for Veterans and Senior Citizen Deduction (must be 65 years or older or disabled.) Contact the Manchester Township Tax Assessors' office for more information.

S. Kaufman moved to waive the reading of the minutes. S. Falk-Zitelli seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Falk-Zitelli moved to approve the June 6, 2018 minutes. S.Kaufman seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

F. Weinstein moved to authorize the Association to contract with Viking Pest Control for pest control services from October 1, 2018 through September 30, 2025 for a cost of \$29,855.00 per year. This expense will be charged to GL# 7410-Exterminating Expense. C.Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

Motion carried.

Community Manager’s Report

Community Manager J. Schultz updated residents on the HVAC system for Encore. He stated that they are just waiting to get the cost of moving New Jersey Natural Gas from the back of the building to the front. We should have it before the next meeting so it can be presented to the BOT at that time.

Community Manager J. Schultz informed residents that inspections on the roofs at Willow Hall, Encore and Leisure Fair were going on for the Solar Panels to see if the buildings can handle having the panels put on. The report should be back shortly so the board can make a decision.

Service Manager J. Snyder stated he has gone out to bid for a generator for Willow Hall. He is still waiting on the cost of New Jersey Natural Gas. The cost at this time is approximately \$47,500.00 without the gas. He is asking the board to give approval to get the final figures, not to exceed \$60,000.00 and this will be presented at the next meeting.

Unfinished Business

1. Radar speed traffic signs. This item will remain on the agenda.

S. Tozzi called a 5 minute recess. S. Tozzi did not return to the meeting due to illness.

The business meeting was adjourned at 3:09 p.m. by Mr. Lupo.

Get Alerts Fast!

What's the fastest way to get important information about our community? Just text the word "Alert" to 22300 from your cell phone. Our OneCallNow messaging system can still call you with a more complete message and email you too, but texting is, by far, the fastest way for you to be informed of Village events. Surprisingly, there's not many of you who take advantage of this great feature, but for those who do, I've heard some wonderful compliments from. Especially, when away, or when en route to the Village, it's a great tool to have.

I know there are a lot of residents who now have cell phones and I also know a fair amount of you don't turn them on until you need to use it. Hopefully, we can persuade you to leave it on for this important purpose. LVW messaging system is not the only reason to leave your phone on. Other important texting services are out there as well, some that can even save lives. Nixle is the best example that comes to mind. Here's what Nixle is, if you don't already know, taken directly off their website <http://www.nixle.com>, "Nixle is a Community Information Service dedicated to helping you stay connected to the information that matters most to you."

Our OneCallNow texting service gives you items more specific to your Village, while Nixle give you area wide info on weather emergencies, criminal activities, missing person alerts and much more. We certainly live in interesting times in where information can disseminate rapidly, so don't get left out. Sign up for Nixle by texting "08759" to 888777 or online at <https://local.nixle.com/register>.

Don't forget to give us your email address too. Email is another great way to get a message out efficiently, especially useful for a more elaborate messages. Sometimes the message is less urgent or needs a bit more of an explanation or may contain a picture or a document, where an email is the only way to accomplish that. Commonly, for important messages we do send all three types of communications: phone, email and text. So make sure we can reach you in every way.

Mind Your Village Ps & Qs

Even if you're not new to our community, it's good to have a refresher course of the most problematic issues for you, your neighbors and the Association. I read there's some inconsistencies where the meaning of "mind your Ps & Qs" came from, but here in the Village I have a different meaning to present to you. First, let's start off with the Qs, I only have one Q and that stands for Question. Question us with everything you intend to do within or around your unit, whatever it may be, to prevent doing something that may not be allowed or something maintenance covers that you weren't aware of, saving you some money.

Now let's move on to the more problematic Ps. The first P stands for Pets. Pets are only problematic if you don't pick up after them immediately. Avoid walking them too close to your neighbors. Better options are at the curb of a main roadway or wooded areas at the outskirts of the Village. Another great spot to take them would be to our dog park. Additionally, be mindful of barking pets too as neighbors might not be as tolerant as you may be with your pet.

Parking is the next P of concern. There are so many issues with parking. First, be aware there's no parking permitted on the street overnight, specifically between the hours of 2 and 6 a.m. When parking on the street in the daytime, be conscious of your neighbors as your parking may give them difficulties backing out or making a turn. Many cul-de-sacs have a turnaround at the end of the road and these are not for parking. Residents are encouraged to park in their garage, if possible. Short term parking is often necessary for guests or sometimes even for your own vehicle. For those instances, please use any 72-hour parking spots located largely in the Encore Overflow area, by the RVs and in isolated areas throughout the rest of the Village. Parking your car in the Village also requires for your vehicle to be in good working order, without flats, major damage and with valid current documentations and inspections. No repair work is to be performed on you vehicle here in the Village as well.

The last P that comes to mind is Permits. Although you may not need a permit for everything, most things will. Summer Storm Preparation

Although hurricane season begins in June and ends in November the more active months typically are August and September. Summer storms bring heavy rains and winds, lightning and downed trees that can cause power outages. Being prepared is the major key to staying safe and informed.

Every six months your emergency supplies should be updated. Be sure to have a flashlight, extra batteries and a portable radio within easy reach. Maintain an emergency supply of water, canned food, such as tuna, canned meats, vegetables, fruits and juices and don't forget the can opener. Remember a portable cell phone charger. Also check your go kit to be sure you have all you need should you have to leave your home.

The safety and care of our pets is just as important and they should have their own emergency supply kit. This should include a supply of water, non-spill food, leashes, cage or carrier and medication, just to name

a few items.

Register Ready is New Jersey's special registry for disabled residents which assists emergency responders in identifying persons with special needs during an emergency. Manchester Township Office of Emergency Response also maintains a registry. LVW Association should be advised of special needs during an emergency as well.

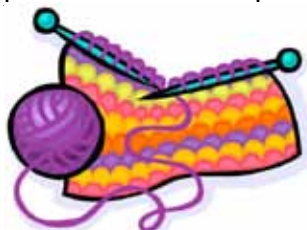

Crocheted Eyelet Stitch Cowl (infinity scarf).

The eyelet stitches are very quick to work up. Pattern is worked in the round. Finished measurements: height: approx. 8.75", circumference: 60" and gauge is not critical. Hook: size H, 5mm. Yarn: aran or worsted weight yarn, approx. 450-500 yds. (I used Lion brand Fishermen's Wool Yarn, 465 yd/425 m) 100% Wool, 1 skein). Stitches: Ch - chain, hdc - half double crochet, sl st - slip stitch, sp - space

Scarf

Ch 154 (60"), join in first chain. Round 1. Ch 2, hdc in first ch, ch 1, [skip 1 ch, hdc in next ch, ch 1] around, join in top of beg. ch 2. Round 2. Sl into next sp, ch 2, hdc in same sp, ch 1, [hdc in next sp, ch 1] around, join in top of beg. ch-2. Repeat Round 2 until piece measures approximately 8.75" from edge, or until desired height, fasten off. Weave in ends.

Fishing Club

Remember super storm Sandy? Bet it played hell with your fishing. It was the deadliest, most destructive hurricane of 2012 inflicting nearly \$70 billion in damage, the second-costliest hurricane on record until surpassed by hurricanes Harvey and Maria in 2017. Sandy became the largest recorded Atlantic hurricane as measured by diameter at 900 miles. 233 people were killed along the path of the storm in eight countries.

Hurricane Sandy developed from a tropical wave in the western Caribbean on October 22 and quickly strengthened. Six hours later she was upgraded to a Tropical Storm, moving slowly northward toward the

Greater Antilles intensifying as she went. On October 24, Sandy became a hurricane, made landfall near Jamaica and re-emerged a few hours later into the Caribbean strengthening into a category two hurricane. On October 25, Sandy hit Cuba as a category three hurricane, weakening to a category one. On October 27, Sandy briefly weakened to a tropical storm and then strengthened to a category one hurricane. On October 29, she curved west-northwest (the "left turn" or "left hook") and then moved ashore near Brigantine, New Jersey, as a post tropical cyclone with hurricane-force winds.

Sandy affected the entire eastern seaboard from Florida to Maine and west across the Appalachian Mountains to Michigan and Wisconsin with particularly severe damage in New Jersey and New York. Its storm surge hit New York City on October 29, flooding streets, tunnels and subway lines and cutting power in and around the city. Damage in the United States amounted to \$65 billion. For us, three days without power and, I'm sure, members of the LVW Fishing Club are now glad they didn't buy beachfront property.

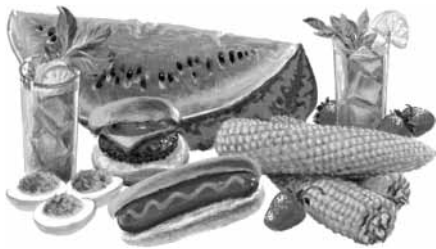

Pinelands Preservation Alliance

Nature Club invites everyone to a meeting on Monday, **August 27** at 7 p.m. in Willow Hall. The Pinelands Preservation Alliance will address local environmental issues; pipeline projects and the Heritage Mineral Tract. The Pinelands Preservation Alliance (PPA) is the only private non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the resources of the New Jersey Pinelands. These issues affect all of us who live in Leisure Village West.

Natural gas pipelines through the Pinelands have been opposed by the Pinelands Preservation Alliance and the public. These commercial ventures pose potential environmental risks such as leakage, rupture, explosion and contamination of water and earth. The rules for acceptable development within the Pinelands National Reserve prohibit this type of infrastructure but commercial and political forces are formidable powers to curtail.

The Heritage Mineral Tract is composed of over 7000 acres located south of Route 70, stretching west from Route 37 to the Whiting Wildlife Management area. The tract is owned by developer Hovsons, Inc. In 2004 a Federal court settlement restricted the development of this site in order to protect water resources and threatened and endangered wildlife. An agreement was created between Hovsons, Inc., the Pinelands Commission and the Department of Environmental Protection. In 2015 a new development plan submitted by the developer to Manchester Township proposed to increase the size and impact of development on 4000 acres of the tract, to include over 6,500 houses and commercial space.

The PPA alerted residents to the proposed massive development being considered by the Township. Many residents attended public meetings and contacted Council members to oppose the development plan. Despite public outcry the Manchester Council passed the ordinance for redevelopment. The mayor vetoed the action.

If it were not for the public outcry the massive redevelopment plan would have been implemented. Please come to this meeting with Pinelands Preservation Alliance to learn about the current status of environmental issues that affect Leisure Village West residents and our neighbors.

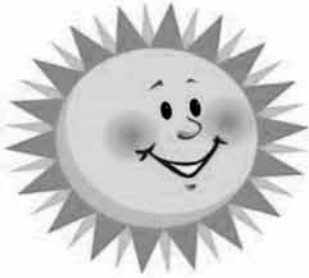

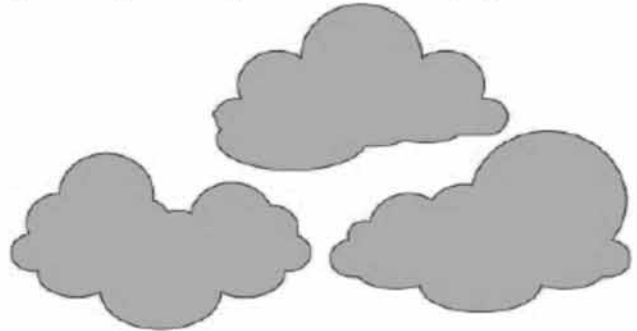

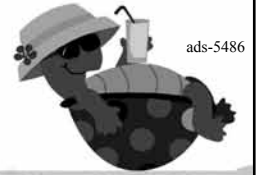

Ballots will be mailed on Monday, **August 6, 2018**. Following instructions, complete, sign and return your ballot in the self-addressed stamped envelope provided. These ballots will be included in the count for quorum.

Election Day this year is Wednesday, **September 5, 2018**. Polls open at 7 a.m. Voting machines and anonymous ballots will be available until 1 p.m.

To vote in person: Voters will proceed to one of three poll positions based on your unit address. ID containing your unit address must be shown. Voters in good standing will sign the poll book.

- Good standing and ***not yet voted***: you can choose to vote by machine or anonymously by paper ballot.
 - Voting machine □you may proceed, cast your vote and leave the area.
 - Anonymous paper ballot □you may proceed to the area provided, complete your ballot, return it to the same poll location and leave the area.
- Good standing, ***already voted by mail*** and wish to change your choice(s): your ballot will be pulled, marked **VOID** and deposited in a clear container for destruction.
 - Voting machine □you may proceed, cast your vote and leave the area.
 - Anonymous paper ballot □proceed to the area provided, complete your ballot, return it to the same poll location and leave the area.

The Annual Meeting of the Members on **September 5, 2018**, will commence at 12:30 p.m. Voting will continue until 1 p.m. when the polls will close. If there is a quorum (minimum of 1347 ballots received), the meeting will be suspended and counting will commence and continue until all votes are counted. Willow Lake Boating Rules

Leisure Village West Association boats are available for use under the following conditions. Boats are available for use from **April 15 through October 15**.

1. Each boat must be restricted to four passengers, of which not more than two are adults.
2. Each boat occupant must wear a life jacket when in a boat. Life jackets are kept in the Gazebo on the pier.
3. Boats must be docked and entered from the shore line, not from the dock.

5. Upon return, boats are to be pulled out of the water onto shore. Oars are to be placed inside boat. Life jackets are to be returned to specified area of Gazebo.
6. Guests under 6 years of age are not permitted in the boats. Guests from 6 to 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.
7. All guests must be accompanied by a resident
8. No swimming or wading in any body of water other than the Village pools.
9. No standing in boats.
10. No one shall go out in a boat alone.

Leisure Village West Willows & Pines Golf Courses Regulations



For the enjoyment of the game of golf and for the proper care and maintenance of the golf courses the following regulations will apply.

Golf courses officially open at 8 a.m. from April to October unless otherwise posted. Players must be 16 years of age. Children and pets are not permitted anywhere on the golf course including sand traps and greens.

General Rules:

1. Residents and guests must wear appropriate badges. Residents must accompany guests.
2. Metal spike golf shoes are not allowed.
3. All players and guests must sign in for each 9 holes. No more than a foursome may play in a group. Tee off is in order of sign-in.
4. Each player must have a minimum of 2 clubs, one of which must be a putter.
5. All play begins on the first hole. Ball must be teed-up on all holes between the markers and no farther back than two club lengths.
6. The second hole tee box must be cleared of players before teeing off from the first tee on both courses. The ninth tee box at the Willows must be cleared of players before teeing off from the eighth tee.
7. Flag sticks and equipment must be kept off the greens.
8. All players must replace divots, rake sand traps, and repair ball marks on the green. Please repair you mark and one other, if necessary, to maintain the integrity of the course.
9. Out of Bounds: Areas outside the white markers and sidewalks are out of bounds. Place ball inbounds at a point where it left the fairway.

Please Note:

Practice putting green: A putter only is allowed. No chipping or pitching on to the green.

Tournaments: Special rules are set forth by the tournament sponsors.

Maintenance Schedule:

Revised and approved May 2, 2018. Supersedes all previous swimming pool rules.

The official opening is Friday, **May 25** for the Willow and Encore pools. Both the Willow and Encore pools will remain open until Sunday, **September 9** (weather permitting and subject to the availability of lifeguards).

NO SWIMMING UNLESS LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY

POOL HOURS:	Willow Pool	11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday – Friday 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekends & holidays
	Encore Pool	10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily <i>Starting July 1: Extra swim hour, Encore pool will close at 9 p.m.</i>
	Aquacisers	10 to 11 a.m. Monday through Friday at Willow Pool Only (NO CLASSES on Holidays or Weekends)
	Lap Lanes	Residents must yield to lap lane swimmers
	Adult Guests	(Accompanied by a resident) Regular pool hours as listed above.
	Youth Guests	4 to 14 years of age (Accompanied by a resident) 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Encore Pool & Pool Area 4 to 7 p.m. at Willow Pool & Pool Area

Youth guests under 4 years of age are not permitted in either pool.

In the event of the closing of one pool; the youth guest hours are as follows at the opened pool: 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4 to 7 p.m. A 20-minute grace period will be allowed for children to exit the pool area at the end of the children's swim hours. Children are not allowed in the pool area at any time other than designated youth hours. Children 10 years of age and under must be accompanied by a parent or grandparent for the entire time they are in the water.

Badges: Members without guests must present their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the monitor stand before admittance to the pool area.

Members with guests must present their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the monitor stand. Members with guests will be required to sign in upon arrival and sign out upon departure. Member's guests will be issued a disposable wristband for the day. Guests must surrender their wristband before leaving the pool area for the day and may only return with a member.

Guests: Up to (4) adult or youth guests are permitted and **MUST** be accompanied by a **RESIDENT** who must **REMAIN** with guests and have the appropriate wristbands at all times.

- Attire:** Proper swim attire must be worn from home to pool since changing area is limited. Cut-off jeans are not allowed in the pool. A cover-up wrap is needed when entering the clubhouses. The Association is not responsible for any discoloration of bathing suits due to pool chemicals. Street shoes are not allowed in the pool. Do not leave shoes or slippers at the pool steps.
- Diapers:** Only diapers specially designed for immersion in water are permitted.
- Safety:** No diving or jumping is allowed at either pool and will be strictly enforced. No sitting or standing on pool steps. Residents and guests may sit on steps where indicated at the Encore Pool. Weather related closures are at the discretion of the lifeguard. The lifeguard will determine when to reopen the pool. Lifeguards do remain on duty during rain.
- Swim Aids:** No floats, toy surfboards or swim toys are permitted in the pool with the exception of noodles. Noodles are not to exceed two per person. Mesh seat noodles are also acceptable. Swimsuits that incorporate a flotation device as part of the suit construction are allowed. Swimmies are allowed. Residents are permitted to use therapeutic aquatic belts. Coast Guard approved life vests are also permitted.
- Health:** **Persons with open wounds are not permitted in either pool or Jacuzzi at any time. Lifeguards will enforce this rule.**
- Food:** Food and beverages are permitted in the pool area. No glass or other similar containers that might cause personal injuries if broken are permitted in the pool areas. **No alcoholic beverages are permitted in the pool areas.** Tables and surrounding area are to be left clean.
- Smoking:** Neither smoking nor vaping are permitted within 25 feet of the pool area. Please use designated areas.
- Lounges, Chairs, Tables:** Lounges, chairs or tables are not to be reserved with a towel, etc. **When leaving the pool area chairs and lounges are to be returned to their proper places.**
- Showers:** Bathers are required to shower before entering the pools. If water shoes are worn please rinse before entering the pool.
- Jacuzzi:** Residents are to read and follow rules posted at the Jacuzzi. **No one under the age of 16 is allowed in the Jacuzzi.**
- Music:** Please use headphones where possible, otherwise be considerate and keep the volume down as not to disturb fellow members.

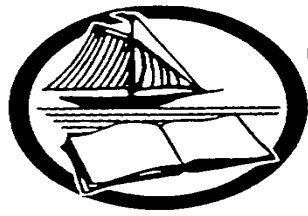

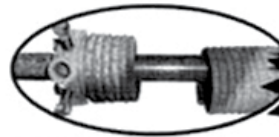

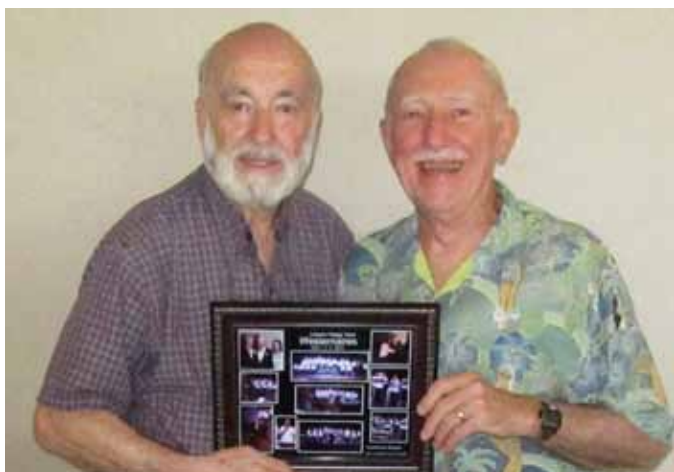
