

## **Board of Trustees Meeting – November 2, 2016**

Present were Louis Maiocco, Charles Lupo, Susan Nordell, Sandra Kaufman, Russ Steenweg, Marge King and Elaine Baumeister. Also present were Community Manager Joseph Schultz, Accounting Administrator Michelle Lampard and Recreation Director Mary Lighthipe.

This meeting commenced at approximately 1 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

- S. Nordell moved to approve the October 5, 2016 and October 19, 2016 minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All in favor. E. Baumeister moved to approve Karen McGinley to the Welcome Committee. C. Lupo seconded. All in favor.
- S. Nordell moved to approve for the Association to contract with Greenman Pedersen Inc. for an in-depth inspection and evaluation of the Willow Hall Gazebo, Pier and Ramp for a total cost not to exceed \$6,500.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3230 Capital Replacement Fund Common Buildings. C. Lupo seconded. All in favor.

#### **Community Managers Report**

J. Schultz reminded residents that pets should never be off leash and to always maintain control of their pets. He also mentioned that no attachments are allowed on the new vinyl fences and that the old wooden gates are not permissible to install with the new vinyl fences. This will be added to the new Resident Handbook for 2017. He stated that Political signs are only to be displayed in a window at a unit and any sign found in the common area will be removed. He is asking the Board to extend the current contract with U.S

Security with no increase for the next year. This will be voted on at the December 7, 2016 meeting. He mentioned that the Board will be holding a Town Hall meeting on Wednesday, November 30, 2016 at 7pm in Willow Hall for residents to address any concerns or present any ideas to the Board.

#### **Recreation Report**

M. Lighthipe reported that Election Day is Tuesday, November 8, 2016. Polls are open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. Districts 21, 22, and 23 vote at Leisure Fair and Districts 28 and 29 votes at Club Encore. The Village bus will provide additional bus service on Election Day. A Holiday Flea Market will take place at Willow Hall on Thursday, November 10 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. A Veteran's Day Ceremony will be held in Club Encore on Friday, November 11 at 11 a.m. The Annual Senior Expo will take place at Club Encore on Saturday, November 12 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Admission is free. The KLVW –TV will sponsor an Open House on Monday, November 14 from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m.

#### **Financial Report**

M. Lampard reported that the independent auditors were on site last week to audit financials FYE September 30, 2016. The auditors will present their report at an open meeting to the residents in January. She also reported that success continues with the Rent Receivership Program which has a total of 24 rentals and approximately \$18,000.00 is collected in rent each month. The balance of the delinquent accounts at the beginning of the project was \$250,000.00 and is now down to \$92,000.00.

TO: All Leisure Village West Unit Owners

RE: Association Insurance Program

DATE: April 15, 2016

Following is a brief outline of the property insurance carried by your association as written through Philadelphia Insurance Company:

In accordance with your association's governing documents, all buildings comprising Leisure Village West Association are insured on an "Original Specifications" basis with a Replacement Cost valuation provision. Put simply, this means that each unit is covered in its entirety in accordance with the builder's original specifications subject to the policy limit (less any applicable deductible). Deductibles are applied on a *per occurrence* basis (currently \$5,000). In accordance with your governing documents, each owner shall be responsible for the deductible applicable to damages to that part of the unit which they are responsible to replace, repair or maintain. Coverage is written on a "Special Perils" basis meaning that all perils are covered except those specifically excluded such as (but not limited to) Flood, Earthquake, Nuclear Accidents, and War. (Additional coverage may have been purchased to delete one or more of these exclusions.)

While very broad in scope, the association's master policy is not intended to cover personal property, loss of use (temporary rental assistance), loss assessment, upgrades or improvements made by any unitowners (past or present), or their personal liability. In light of this, it is highly recommended that each owner and/or tenant consult with their insurance professional and provide them with the above information when determining their personal insurance needs. # Happy Holidays

#### Time to Talk Snow

When talking about weather, there's nothing I've grown to dislike more than snow and I think some of you may feel the same. Hopefully the La Niña effect will keep the white stuff at bay, but if it doesn't and you're somewhat of a newcomer, you may need to know a little bit about the snow clearing process.

First I should mention that snow operations are triggered, when we're not already onsite, at the 2 inch accumulation mark. This is always a tough decision and depends heavily on conditions and forecasts. That's the damned if you do and damned if you don't phase. We need to make the right decision as you don't want to call staff in, only to have the snow melt quickly, wasting manpower and resources. Even worse, have a light snowfall, 2 inch or less, that quickly turns to ice. Now that we have the brine equipment and pretreatment process it has helped mitigate these problems and ease the decision making somewhat. Snowfall timing, conditions and characteristics of the snow itself make a dramatic difference on the job we do and how fast we can do it, but you must know that we'll work around the clock to get you that one way out of your house.

That's what initiates our action and the following is the outline of what we do and how we do it along with some other useful information.

#### **Snow Clearing Order**

- 1. Main roads are first on the list and may be done several times until the storm starts to subside so we can move on to the next step.
- 2. After the main thoroughfares are substantially passable, side roads and finger-streets are the next item we concentrate on. Again, depending on the magnitude and longevity of the storm, this too may need to be redone as snow may have accumulated on roads done early in the process. Community Building parking lots are also started during this phase.
- 3. Next, the driveways and unit walkways without garages (AKA single entry units), will be started after snowfall has significantly stopped and main roads and side roads have been opened and are passable. This may be your primary and only way out for an extended period of time. Under normal conditions this is usually a 24-hour period and heavy storms will certainly extend that time.
- 4. We now start on the back walks, and to be clear, that's the walkways on the garage side of the house. This is also when we are clearing the bus stops, mailboxes and the fire hydrants.
- 5. After the completion of all the above and as time permits, main sidewalks and front sidewalks will be done throughout the village.

Obviously, it is impossible to start every area at once so rotation of the starting place is implemented.

Your cooperation is requested by remaining in your home as long as possible for your own safety until the snow clearing is complete. Resident must remove all cars from the roadway to allow for the best street snow clearing as possible. Tune in to Village Creeper Channel 15 for additional information. Now with our OneCallNow system, we'll try to keep you updated periodically during the storm and provide other relevant information as needed. For storm preparation, please see our resident handbook

#### **Snow Clearing Priority List**

If you receive dialysis or chemotherapy, you must submit a letter from your treatment facility listing the days and times of treatments.

For 136 years, ORT schools have trained millions of Jewish and non-Jewish students worldwide, teaching them not only a trade or a profession, but also helping them become a credit to their communities. Our fundraising helps students like Joseph. Joseph grew up in Johannesburg in an area of 250,000 people originally designed for 70,000 residents, with challenging conditions, including over-crowded schools and poorly trained teachers. Joseph lives with ten family members. He hated math and was failing in physical science. He joined the ORT Second Chance program and improved his marks to passing. Through ORT, Joseph has an internship in a corporate logistics department and is applying for scholarships to study engineering. "ORT changed my life," Joseph relates. "ORT has given me so many opportunities. ORT gave us hope where there was none."

Another ORT graduate from Argentina, Gino Tubaro, age 20, majored in electronics at ORT. Tubaro graduated top in his year and is studying electronic engineering at the National Technological University. Gino has already had a series of accomplishments: Co-designing a prosthetic hand for an 11-year-old boy using a 3D printer, receiving two awards from the World Intellectual Property Organization and winning the Inventive Olympics.

ORT reaches out to those in need. The World ORT STEM program works in schools in the former Soviet Union. The flagship St. Petersburg institution, the de Gunzburg School, is attended by over 450 students (grades 1 - 11) and is unique. Known for robust academics, Jewish studies, customized learning and family participation for many in the St. Petersburg Jewish community, the school represents the gateway to discoveries about their Jewish background and culture (so long denied by the Soviet government). Without ORT, state funding would be available for a basic curriculum, but students would miss the school's blend of outstanding technical studies and Jewish instruction to advance a high level of education and traditions across generations, and families would lose a cultural center in existence since 1993.

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
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# **Kevin's Kids Need Your Help**

# **Helping Hands**

#### **For Your Information**

From September 22 to October 22, 89 requests were made in these 30 days. 26 light bulbs were changed; 15 electronic requests (program a remote, etc); 8 miscellaneous; 7 window problems (blinds, etc.); 6 requests for tasks we do not do; 5 bathroom requests (toilet seats, etc.); 5 cancellations (relative or neighbor did); 4 hoses (unhooked, etc.); 3 storm windows (exchanged from screens, etc.); 3 doors (door off the track, etc.); 2 items moved; 2 smoke alarms got new batteries; 2 handicap equipment (one added, one delivered) and 1 referral to Viston.



# Helpful Hints by Sheldon R. Mead

Make old, formerly water-resistant cloth jackets water-resistant again with a hair dryer. Set a hair dryer to high, then slowly move it around the outer surface of the jacket. Many, though not all, waterproof cloth garments are treated with something called a "durable water repellent coating." Over time, the coating starts to deteriorate, decreasing its effectiveness. Heat can reactivate the water-repelling properties.

Remove stickers or tape from mirrors or windows with mayonnaise. Stickers and tape often leave an adhesive residue behind when they are peeled from mirrors or windows. Scraping the residue away can take a lot of effort. Instead, place a dab of mayonnaise on a paper towel and apply this to the adhesive. After a minute or two, the adhesive residue should give way without much scrubbing or scraping – sometimes it simply wipes away with a paper towel.

Pick up broken glass with bread. Hundreds of tiny shards often are spread across the floor when glass breaks. Sweeping never removes them all. Next time glass breaks in your home, sweep away the larger pieces, then press a few slices of bread onto the broken-glass area. Even very small shards will lodge in the bread. Dispose of these slices of bread immediately so that people and pets don't mistake them for food.

People consume 65 percent more calories when eating with someone who takes a second helping than when they eat with someone who doesn't. Self-defense – have a cup of herbal tea after you finish your main course. It has no calories and keeps your mouth busy, so you will be less tempted to take seconds or order dessert even if your companion does.

## **How to Submit Club News**

Following is a 'Style Sheet' and tips on how to submit an article for your club or organization for publication in the *Leisure Village West News*. This is an updated guide for all publicity chairpersons who submit their club news to our publication. Please keep this for your reference. Printed copies can be found in the News office and online for download.

#### **Submission Guidelines**

- 1. Submit by the deadline date, which is BY or BEFORE the **FIRST of each month** for the following month's publication. (ex. June publication deadline is May 1st)
- 2. Submit your item by email to <a href="mailed-emaile
- <u>Important Email Note:</u> Please put the name of your club and month for publication in your subject line of the email and note if there are photos and an article or exactly what is attached. Filenames of your articles should include the club name and month for submission!
- 3. **Do not submit handwritten articles.** There is no one on staff to type them for the publisher. Articles must be typed and emailed to us.
- 4. **DO NOT TYPE ANY PART OF YOUR ARTICLE IN ALL CAPS.** This includes the title, byline and article. We will **NOT** print it if you submit it this way. Also, please do not <u>underline</u>. We will **bold** your upcoming event dates. All articles submitted must be typed in upper and lower case. Please indent paragraphs.
- 5. **Keep your article short**, except for special events/occasions. Club articles should be approx. **350 words** or fewer.
- 6. **Photographs:** You can submit up to 4 photos via email in JPEG format. **DO NOT SUBMIT COLLAGES!** We will print as many as space allows. There is no guarantee they will all be printed. Photos should be CLEAR. Generally, close-ups of groups of people are better than distant shots. Please **DO NOT** submit *blurry* photos. They will not be printed. Label them properly so we know what club they are for and be sure to include captions. Digital photos are ideal. Do not submit photos printed from the computer on paper. Please email them.
- 7. **Upcoming events**: List the day, date, time and location. For past events, just the date should be used. *Example: On April 15, the board finalized nominations*. In setting dates, leave out the year except in December for January. (It is assumed you are speaking about the current year.) For upcoming events, avoid using *will be held on, will be held at.* Instead, just state it simply. For example: *Our next meeting will be April 17. Please join us on May 5 for our general meeting.*
- 8. **Include a Byline!** Articles must have the name of the writer below title so we know who submitted it! By Author's Name.
- 9. *Please check spellings of all names carefully in your articles and photo captions!* We may not always be familiar with the person you are mentioning and we'd really hate to spell their name wrong! Thank you!

#### Formatting & Editing Guidelines:

**Club News:** Start with the Name of your Club. Then add a "headline" that calls attention to something the club is doing, did, or is planning. (Study local newspapers to see how clever some reporters are – you too can be catchy!)

- a. As far as zeroes and times go, use \$5 instead of \$5.00, and use 10 p.m. (or a.m.) rather than 10:00 PM (or A.M.)
- b. When posting information about a club, please remember, dates are never "5th, 1st, 2nd, or 3rd." Example-Correct: the meeting July 2, or November 3. Incorrect: the meeting of July 2nd or November 3rd.
- c. For consistency, please indicate telephone numbers as follows. Example: Call Jane at 732-123-4567. (No parentheses around area codes or phone numbers please!)
- d. One exclamation point! or question mark? will do don't use three or four.

- e. Avoid apostrophes that are not possessive. Example--Incorrect: The 50's. Correct: The 50s. Apostrophes are for the possessives in life George's dog; Anne's dessert. Exception: "Its" which is always possessive-- Correct: "The dog ate its dinner."
- f. "It's" means it is Example It's time to leave for work.
- g. Do not use "etc." If there is something more to the list, please finish the sentence.
- h. Avoid abbreviations: "Pres." looks like you didn't have the time to spell it out. It won't take up that much space. The same goes for Mon., Feb. 2—spell it out: Monday, February 2.
- i. When using the name of one of the 50 United States: Eight state names are never abbreviated in text: Alaska, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Maine, Ohio, Texas and Utah. State abbreviations may be used for the remaining 42 states. Spell out the name of a state when it stands alone—Example: We went to Delaware on vacation. When in doubt, spell it out!
- j. Please note: U.S. has periods; USA does not; Washington, D.C. has periods. You may not need to use a state reference we all know where Brooklyn, Toms River, Freehold and Chicago are.
- k. When listing a dinner/lunch event to come, you may wish to list the main menu items, but if the event has passed, suffice to say, "We enjoyed a hot buffet." (Chicken Murphy, potatoes, rice, carrots, green beans, rolls, coffee, tea, soda, and dessert is not necessary, especially when speaking of an event held two months ago!)
- 1. To sharpen your message and give it 'punch,' leave out 'that' as often as possible and cut loose each and every "the" in your article. Try it with and without see which version reads best. "Very" is very overused! Example Everyone was very pleased with the very entertaining performance. Incorrect: We had a very, very, very good time and a very good meal. Correct: We had a great time and a delicious meal.
- m. Type commas and periods before closed quotes. Example: in a list of titles, it is: "Lorna Doone," "Tom Sawyer," and "The Avengers." Note: titles must be italicized. Magazine names, reference books, dictionaries and newspaper names are typed in italics only: Leisure West News. Book titles, movies, plays, songs, television programs and works of art are typed in "quotes and italics" "The Star Spangled Banner," "Gone with the Wind," "The Mary Tyler Moore Show."
- n. Spell out *Leisure Village West News* (in italics) it is not LWN or LW News.
- o. LVW has no periods (Please spell out Leisure Village West). Capitalize the first letter in 'Bulletin,' 'Creeper,' and 'Village.' The names of the clubhouses are always either Willow Hall or Club Encore.
- p. Tell it like it is! Be positive, not redundant! For example-- Incorrect: Go up to the computer terminal before you and make sure you turn the On button on. Correct: Face the computer screen and push the on button.
- q. When listing people or items: Commas generally between each one except for before the last listed. Correct Example: Joe, Mary and Chris went to the show. NOT: Joe, Mary, and Chris went to the show. Try not to overuse commas.
- r. Use the grammar feature on your toolbar on the computer. It will tell you if what you just wrote needs a quick rewrite.
- s. Please write your articles from the standpoint of the month in which the newspaper is issued (rather than the date you are actually writing the article.) For example, you may be writing in May about an event that took place in April and will appear in the June magazine. When announcing upcoming events, take notice that they are still "upcoming" when the next Leisure Village West News comes out. (We often have to change wording from, 'We look forward to our May 28 luncheon' to 'We enjoyed the May 28 luncheon.') If you have any question, please **feel free to email** me at <a href="mailto:news@lvwa.net">news@lvwa.net</a> and I will return your email as

quickly as possible. You can also call the *Leisure Village West News* office at 732-657-0181 and leave a message. A member of our staff will return your call as soon as possible. (Our office is staffed part time so please be patient).

Please note that all submissions are subject to review and editing by the editor and volunteer staff. We reserve the right to edit or refuse publication based on the criteria listed within this guideline. We will not accept items that promote negativity, politically charged items, etc. Not everything submitted is guaranteed publication. We make every effort to include all club news we receive and give the Village readers a great publication! Thank you for your anticipated cooperation!

Stories should be approximately 350 words or fewer. The editor reserves the right to decide how many and what poems/stories will be published. Leisure Village West residents' material will take precedence over other submitted material.

## Garden Club

#### Caring For Plants When It's Too Cold Outside

First, a reminder that our Holiday Party is at the Clarion Hotel at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday, **December 14**. There is no regular meeting.

Also, pick up your poinsettia orders at Leisure Fair on Friday, **December 2** from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

So, what to do when you cannot exercise your "green thumb" outdoors? Houseplants will tide you over! Winter and spring cacti are happy to oblige with flowers in December or in April. These plants are actually succulents, not true cacti, but they do not need a lot of water, just a sunny spot. They make good houseplants year round and will set bloom when days are short and they have twelve hours of light or less each day. No need to repot as they prefer to be crowded in the pot. Dracaenas, of which there are many varieties, are great houseplants and do not require too much light. They are also happy to stay in a crowded pot.

Poinsettias need to be in a bright room and kept away from cold drafts. Water them lightly throughout the winter season. It is possible to keep poinsettias from year to year. If they are kept in total darkness for a couple a months before the holiday season they will bloom again.

Once the heat is turned on, homes become extremely dry and many plants will need additional watering. Houseplants can be set on tray with moistened stones to add humidity. If you have a tendency to overwater and kill houseplants it may be helpful to buy a water meter to check the moisture in the soil. Meters are available in garden stores for less than \$10. Check your pot's soil in two different places and water if the meter indicates that they are getting dry, about once a week. If you find your plants need to be watered more than twice a week, try watering them a bit more generously. Tip: yellowing leaves are a sign of under watering and also of overwatering! So stick a finger in the soil and if it is dry like sand, it is too dry! If it is wet like mud it is overwatered. Think in terms of a moist sponge to get the Goldilocks (just right) effect.








## **Nature Club**

90 Acres of History, Beauty and Cranberries

The "90 acres" refers to Cloverdale Farm County Park, opened in 2015. The Nature Club's October meeting included an informative and well-illustrated presentation by Patti Trasferini of Ocean County Parks and Recreation. The park has a long history as a working farm. Cranberries, a main crop, continue to grow in the bogs at Cloverdale. Cranberries are still an important commercial crop in this area. Pictures and personal stories that Patti has learned



Cloverdale Farm County Park is a perfect place to enjoy the natural beauty of the Pinelands in any season. This small park offers a good variety of environments to explore. A 1.4 mile self-guided walking trail leads visitors through the wetlands, uplands, along cranberry bogs and the remains of structures from the days when it was a working cranberry farm. The trail map, interpretive signs and exhibits in the visitor center give explanations of cranberry farming as well as information on local flora and fauna. Cloverdale Farm Park is open daily and the visitor center is open and staffed by a naturalist on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. This park is just 25 minutes away!

A regular program of nature walks and bird walks are offered, as well as special programs including nature photography, art and craft lessons and talks on topics related to the park and environment. For a complete listing of the current programs see the Ocean County Parks, Recreation and Natural Lands Trust Newsletter which is available at the Ocean County Library, or online at www.oceancountyparks.org.


