

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

Board of Trustees Meeting – October 3, 2018

Present were L. Maiocco, C. Lupo, S. Tozzi, A. D'Amato, F. Weinstein and E. Murphy. Also present were Community Manager J. Schultz, Service Manager J. Snyder, Accounting Administrator M. O'Connor and Recreation Director M. Lighthipe. Absent was S. Falk-Zitelli.

This meeting commenced at approximately 1 p.m with the Pledge of Allegiance.

- L. Maiocco stated that the Assistant Treasurer will now be A. D'Amato and Assistant Secretary will now be S. Falk-Zitelli. Liaison assignments were given as follows: Administration Committee F. Weinstein; Architectural Committee C. Lupo; Community Services Committee S. Falk-Zitelli; Finance Committee E. Murphy and Special Projects S. Tozzi.
- F. Weinstein moved to waive the reading of the minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.
- F. Weinstein moved to approve the September 20, 2018 minutes. A. D'Amato seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.
- S. Tozzi moved to approve the Leisure Village West Pharmacy, LLC lease. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.
- C. Lupo moved to approve the agreement with EZnergy for the installation of solar panel systems on Club Encore, Association Office, Willow Hall and Leisure Fair for a total cost of \$813,564.00 with funds provided by GL#3230 Capital Replacement Common Buildings. The installation and material costs for each building involved will be returned and converted into an 84-month lease with a path to ownership

at the end. The unaudited balance for this account as of 8/31/18 is \$1,315,199.88. S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor.

- L. Maiocco stated that the Board approved Jim Fasciani as a member to the Finance Committee.
- M. Lighthipe gave a report for the Recreation Department.

Community Manager Report

J. Schultz asked that all residents pay the amount given to them on their maintenance coupon book, which includes the fee for the bulk television service from Verizon. The Association office will contact any resident who has a credit due. He mentioned that the community channels start on 1970, 1971, 1972 and are aware of the issue that some residents may be experiencing trouble viewing them. He reminded residents not to put out garbage or garden debris too early. He stated there is a last call for a resident to submit a resume for the Community Services Committee and that you must be a resident owner. He mentioned that Hotwire is interested in having a space in LVW to collect equipment being returned; he is working on providing a space for them.

Service Manager J. Snyder mentioned that the roofs scheduled for 2018 have been completed and is requesting the Association office roof be replaced in the 2018 roofing schedule due to deteriorating roofing conditions which is causing several leaks. It is recommended that Roofing Masters replace the roof for a total cost of 18,570.00. All permits and taxes included. This expense will be provided by account# 3230 - Capital Replacement-Common Buildings. The Board agreed to vote on this at the next open Board meeting on October 17, 2018. He also requested that the following addresses be added onto the 2018 roofing schedule due to deteriorating roofing conditions which is causing several leaks; 731A & 733B Chatham Lane, 27A,B,C&D Sterling Street, 939A&B Liverpool Circle and 892A&B Stratford Court. It is recommended to contract Roofing Masters

for a total cost of \$51,828.50. All permits and taxes are included. This expense will be provided by account# 3270 – Capital Replacement-Roofs. The Board also agreed to vote on this at the next open Board meeting on October 17, 2018.

J. Schultz stated that he has gone out to bid for the Waste contract. He has received one bid in which is the current company being used by the Association and it came in over-budget. He is exploring other avenues such as in-house trash collection.

Unfinished Business

C. Lupo moved to approve the revisions to Specification 2_4, "To Install Bathroom Window in Oxford Model in Greenery Models and a Cambridge for Willow Models". S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

Encore Coffee Vending will be voted on at next open Board meeting on October 17, 2018. Work to begin in November.

The charge for the Woodshop badge usage will be reviewed by the Association attorney for any changes that are decided on.

- F. Weinstein moved to approve C.J. Hesse to repave the side roads, driveways and the main road of Cambridge Circle for a total cost of \$594,895.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account# 3290 Capital Replacement Roads. S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.
- L. Maiocco reported that the Board discussed how minutes/notes are taken and some feedback received was how audience comments are recorded. They will now be published with the comment and/or question along with the answer. He mentioned that the Board is working on how to respond to emails and letters received from residents.

There being no further business, the Board meeting adjourned at approximately 2:04 p.m.

Audience Comments

This portion of the meeting began at approximately 2:04pm.

Resident: J. Ritter asked if the Board would consider installing a ramp or lift on the stage at Willow Hall for safety reasons.

Response: The Board will look into that.

Resident: W. Dylewski suggests that the Board use the Association One-Call system more frequently

to notify residents of events, water restrictions, etc. He also thanked staff on improvements made on recreation.

Response: Mary, Recreation Director has now been trained to use the One-Call system and has used it for an event so far.

Resident: P. Burke asked what happens to all the residents that have paid for the gym badge, since the Association discontinued charging as of October 1, 2018 and will a credit be issued?

Response: There will be no credit issued.

Resident: P. Burke also asked if the Board would consider another seated elliptical machine and possibly expanding the room.

Response: The Board has discussed creating a Committee to look into reviewing improvements to the gym and possibly expanding it. More information will be provided in the future.

Resident: K. McGinley asked if the Flu Vaccine is given why not the pneumonia shot.

Response: The pneumonia shot has a lot of medical restrictions the company does not want the responsibility.

Resident: K. McGinley also asked why Club Encore is not being remodeled.

Response: Staff is currently working on a plan. Quotes will be given to the Board on the Auditorium for the Board to review.

Resident: K. McGinley mentioned that the Pet Club is having its Annual Dog Day Afternoon on October 13.

Resident: J. Langreich suggests having someone explain how to use the gym equipment.

Response: The Board is expecting to have videos available on how to use the equipment on the community channels when they are set up. Currently the videos can be viewed on the lywcreeper.com.

Resident: J. Langreich mentioned the fall blood drive is on October 30th.

Resident: L. Robinson announced the annual breakfast for the Knights of Columbus on October 20.

Resident: M.L. Ruggerio asked if the Association has to reach a quota on use of the vending machines in order to keep them.

Response: Does not believe that there is a minimum on the contracted vending machines such as the soda and snack ones. The coffee vending machine will eventually be owned by the Association.

Resident: K. Hooyer stated that she saw in the Manchester Times that the fire hydrant draining will be occurring which would affect the ice cube makers.

Response: The Association has not received an announcement yet but when they have residents will be notified.

Resident: C. Ritter stated that he has automatic payments with the Association and asked if it will be adjusted to reflect the new fee.

Response: Yes

Resident: C. Ritter also stated that is aware that the

Ocean County Tax Assessors are visiting the Village but his unit has not been visited.

Response: They started in here 3 to 4 weeks ago and it takes about 2 to 3 months to complete the Village.

Board Comment: L. Maiocco stated that the Board will be discussing the replacement of Willow pool at the next Board meeting on October 17, 2018.

Resident: mentioned that the Fishing Club is sponsoring the Toys for Tots program at Willow Hall.

Resident: J. Ritter asked if the Board considered an indoor pool for the winter season.

Response: Yes, that is one of the topics the Board has discussed and continues to do so.

There being no further comments, the meeting ended at approximately 2:25 p.m.

Board of Trustees Meeting – October 17, 2018

Present were L. Maiocco, C. Lupo, S. Falk-Zitelli, S. Tozzi, A. Damato, F. Weinstein and E. Murphy. Also present were Community Manager J. Schultz, Service Manager J. Snyder and Accounting Administrator M. O'Connor. Absent was Recreation Director M. Lighthipe.

This meeting commenced at approximately 7 p.m with the pledge of allegiance.

- S. Falk-Zitelli moved to waive the reading of the minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.
- F. Weinstein moved to approve the October 3, 2018 minutes. S. Falk-Zitelli seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.
- A. D'Amato moved to approve Roofing Masters to replace the roof at 959 Buckingham Drive (Association Office) for a total cost of \$18,570.00, all permits and taxes included. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3230 Capital Replacement Common Buildings. The unaudited balance for this account as of 8/31/18 is \$1,315,199.88. C. Lupo seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.
- C. Lupo moved to approve Roofing Masters to replace the roofs at 731A&B Chatham Lane, 27 A,B,C&D Sterling Street, 939A&B Liverpool Circle and 892A&B Stratford Court for a total cost of \$51,828.50. The funds to meet this expense will be

provided by account #3270 – Capital Replacement-Roofs. The unaudited balance for this account as of 8/31/18 is \$931,796.16. E. Murphy seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

Committee Reports

T. Hardman, Chairperson gave the Architectural Committee report.

There was no report for the Community Services Committee.

B. Craft, member gave the Finance Committee report for M. L. Doner, Chairperson.

Trustee Liaison F. Weinstein gave the Administration Committee report for Chairperson J. Langreich.

Community Manager J. Schultz gave a report for the Recreation Department.

Community Manager Report

J. Shultz reminded residents that paving will begin in two to three weeks in the Cambridge Circle area. He mentioned that the paving in the Cambridge section will be the streets and the driveways. He stated at the time of the driveway paving residents will be asked to leave their garage doors open to get as close to the apron for the milling and paving process. He stated that when the time gets closer a one-call will be given to notify the residents in that area. He mentioned that the LVW phone directory will be printed in roughly a

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month for the 2019 season and reminded residents to make sure their name and phone number is correct at the Association office. He stated that it is published monthly on the LVWcreeper. He also mentioned that LVW's insurance agent Tom Mitchell from Mitchell Insurance will be attending the next open Board meeting on November 7 to discuss HO6 insurance.

Unfinished Business

F. Weinstein moved to approve the Association to create a location at Club Encore equipped with a vending area and gathering space at a cost not to exceed \$22,000.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account# 3230 – Capital Replacement-Common Buildings. E. Murphy seconded. All in favor. Motion carried.

The Board has agreed to remove the charge for the Woodshop room. Beginning in the New Year, residents will be required to review an instructional video on the equipment and sign a legal waiver for permission to use the Woodshop room.

J. Schultz received one-bid for the Waste Contract renewal from Central Jersey Waste for a two-year term at a cost of \$621,480.00. He is asking the Board to vote at the next open Board meeting on November 7, 2018.

There is no New Business.

Board President L. Maiocco gave the board report. He stated that there will be Co-Liaisons for the Community Services Committee and they will be S. Falk-Zitelli and A. D'Amato. The next step is to form the Committee. He stated that the December publication for the LVW news will include audience comments/questions and answers from the Board meetings.

There being no further business, the Board meeting adjourned at approximately 7:31 p.m.

Audience Comments

This portion of the meeting began at approximately 7:31 p.m.

Resident: M. Lamberti mentioned at the last Board meeting her concerns regarding the policy for when officers take their term and stated that the Bylaws were to be amended. She was told the resolution was supposed to be attached and read which it was not and told she would be given a copy which she has.

Response: The final signatures for the resolution were signed just before the open Board meeting and

will then be filed with the County Clerk.

Resident: M. Lamberti then read the statement from the resolution: "Candidate(s) receiving the highest number of votes cast at the 2018 Annual Election Meeting shall be certified at the first board meeting following the Annual Election Meeting" and stated that that meeting was the Annual meeting.

Response: The actual Annual Meeting was when the votes were taken. The following meeting was when the policy resolution was read so that they could take office because the Bylaws state that Candidates cannot take office until October 1. This was a temporary resolution to allow them to vote at that meeting prior to October 1. An Amendment will still need to be made to make this a permanent solution before the next Election.

Resident: A. Weiner asked how many units have been installed with FIOS.

Response: As of the last report, 1,515 people have been installed.

Resident: A. Weiner asked if there is a plan to get the rest of them installed.

Response: Some residents are still under contract for their satellite dishes and residents have until the end of December before they forced into this. Residents are strongly encouraged to install sooner. J. Schultz stated that in the contract, if residents are gone for the winter they are entitled to one free install when they come back.

Resident: A. Weiner suggested getting a list of residents that have not been installed and develop a Committee of resident volunteers to reach out to help residents order services. He stated that the Verizon contract states you need permission to use the provider's logo. He suggested approaching Verizon to get permission to call this village a "FIOS Community" to upscale this community and help with the resales.

Response: A. Weiner was asked if he would be willing to volunteer for said Committee.

A. Weiner Response: Absolutely.

Resident: P. Brown thinks residents that have already been installed for FIOS since August should be notified for how much they will owe come November.

Response: So far the Association has received three bills from Verizon and on each bill they have

notified the Association who has been installed and the pro-rated amount owed prior to October 1. Residents will receive a phone call from Susan Moore in LVW's Accounting Department telling you what you have to pay for your pro-rated amount prior to October 1. As of October 1, the bulk service fee is included in the monthly maintenance fee.

Resident: P. Brown asked what the dollar amount is per diem.

Response: Basically a dollar a day.

Resident: Y. Fish congratulated the new Board and notices how different things have been running. She asked if the Board would consider beginning in April and after the pool closes to leave the lounge chairs and tables out so that residents can socialize.

Response: The Board will discuss and get back to the residents.

Resident: W. Dylewski thanked the Board for suspending the fee for the Woodshop room. He stated that the Finance Club reviewed 30 residents HO6 declaration pages and it was an eye opener. He is glad that LVW's insurance will be attending the next open Board meeting and encouraged residents to attend this meeting.

Response: None

Resident: F. Martin stated that he has noticed the medallions in the center of two units and mentioned that many of them are different, not consistent and have been overlooked. He believes they need to be fixed.

Response: the Maintenance Department will take a look into this.

Resident: P. Bosco asked for an update on the Willow Pool replacement.

Response: stated that due to the different ideas of the pool replacement there would not be enough time to replace the pool in time for the opening of the 2019 pool season. The Board is still discussing different ideas and the replacement will take place in 2020.

Resident: W.Dylewski asked whose debris is left on the right of way under the powerlines.

Response: It is LVW's garden debris that is collected from residents or tree chips. The debris collected is then turned into soil/mulch but takes time to break down.

Resident: W. Dylewski asked if private landscapers are using that area.

Response: J. Snyder stated they sure hope not. They have been caught in the past.

Resident: J. Ercolino stated he hopes LVW is careful what is being stored there and that the tree chips are not from trees that are diseased.

Response: It's mainly branches and logs are hauled out of the Village.

Resident: J. Ercolino asked for an update on the Rutgers study for the water allocation and dying trees in the Village.

Response: the water allocation is going on. He stated that they actually do a water recovery program and he met with them last week to review all the storm drains and catch basins. That is part of what gets submitted to the State and DEP to show how much water LVW is actually recovering back into the aquifer. This is to help increase our water allocation. It is a slow process but is underway. LVW did have a company come in to do a tree study. They created a map/ database of every tree and listed 240 that needed to be removed and another 1200 that needs pruning. The cost to do this from them is very high. LVW will take this and compile into an RFP and send out to local landscapers. They will begin with any dangerous trees.

Resident: S. Garafalo thanked the Board for putting audience comments in the LVW news but asked that the Board consider the audience comments be part of the business portion of the Board meetings.

There being no further comments, the meeting ended at approximately 7:56 p.m.

Manager's Corner

Happy Holidays



In last month's issue I went over the snow priority list. Refer to that issue or your handbook to be included in this year's snow events.

I guess it's that time of year again when we must talk snow, argh! Maybe it would make me feel better if I could narrate this like Jean Shepherd. Try to imagine.

It was a cold and blustery night in Leisure Village West. Okay stop. Shepherd I'm not, so here once again, is how we handle snow. Snow removal on the main roads will start upon arrival of labor and equipment after a two-inches of snow accumulates.

During any snow event, it's extremely important to remove vehicles from the roadways, so snow-clearing equipment can operate properly and efficiently. If possible, please remove your vehicles from driveways as this has a considerable impact on clearing driveway snow, especially for your neighbor. Most of our clearing equipment is too large to clear a double driveway with a car on one side, so often they're left behind and cleaned up later when the smaller equipment is used.

Once a major snowfall operation starts, we typically start shiftwork and work around the clock until each unit has at least one way out. For most units, that will be your garage door. Residents should make provisions now to clear a pathway in your garage to avoid last minute problems.

Your cooperation is requested by remaining in your home as long as possible for your own safety until the snow clearing is complete. Tune in to Village Creeper Channel 1970 for additional information. We'll also try to keep you updated via the OneCallNow system when possible. Furthermore, everyone wants to be first, but it is impossible to start every area at once, so rotation of the starting place will be done for each separate snowfall event.

Snow Clearing Order

- ✓ Brine is applied to the main roads prior to the impending storm.
- ✓ Main roads are first and will continue to be plowed on until the accumulating snow diminishes.
- ✓ Secondary roads will soon follow and will continue until snowfall stops.
- ✓ Once the snowfall stops accumulating, driveways and single-entry walkway units (without garages) will be started. This will be your one way out for quite some time.
- ✓ After the completion of all the above and as time permits, garage side walkways, garbage can lids, bus stops, mailboxes, fire hydrants, main sidewalks and much later the front sidewalks will be done.

Please Have a Healthy and Safe Holiday Season!

Please use extra caution this holiday season with all your decorations and cooking. Remember not to use space heaters and don't overload electrical circuits. From all of us to all of you, we like to wish everyone a Happy Holiday and a Happy and Healthy New Year.





Hunters of the Sky Visit Nature Club

Raptors are birds that hunt from the sky and include eagles, owls, osprey, hawks, vultures and others. Wildlife rehabilitator Katie Corris brought three raptors from Cedar Run Wildlife Refuge for the October Nature Club meeting. All three birds: a Red-tailed Hawk, a Great Horned Owl and a Turkey Vulture had been hit by cars. Because their injuries are permanent the owl and hawk cannot be returned to the wild. The vulture came to the rehabilitation hospital as a young bird and imprinted on the human handlers. He does not know how to be a vulture, so lives at the refuge.

It is a rare privilege to see raptors at close range. Katie pointed out and explained each bird's adaptations that make the species successful with their individual hunting and feeding strategies. For example owls are equipped with large eyes, good vision in dim light, facial feathers that focus sound on their sensitive ears; adaptations that help the owl locate prey.

Woodford Cedar Run Wildlife Refuge in Medford includes a rehabilitation hospital, nature center, trails and a picnic area. Over 4,500 injured or orphaned native animals come to this refuge hospital each year. The Refuge is open to visitors all year. See www. cedarrun.org.

The next meeting of Nature Club is on Monday, **January 28** with a presentation on Blue Claw Crabs. These fascinating creatures are our close neighbors, making their home in the estuaries along our NJ shore. Join us for an interesting evening.



Guidelines for Holiday Decorations

Resident Process

It's time to prepare for the holidays - Christmas, Hanukkah, and New Years. The main subjects are family and friends. This article ran last December, but I think this is a good time for a review

This time of year we often see relatives and loved ones that we haven't seen for a while. We want to capture the festive atmosphere and good time that everyone is enjoying. What can we do to make these images look relaxed and more professional?

For candid shots make certain you're prepared -- have your camera ready and watch the subject for the expression you want. If you aren't ready the shot will be gone before you press the shutter. Most holiday shots will be taken indoors so don't forget to use your camera's flash

For portraits and group shots get yourself set up first, and then prepare your subject. If you keep them waiting you will not get a natural relaxed image. For individual portraits choose a background that's festive,

but not too busy. Have your subject(s) turn their shoulders slightly so they are not too square to the camera.

When photographing grandchildren or pets try to get eye level with them, rather than shooting down at them.

I also like to photograph the festive holiday decorations. These often make fun shots and can be used on your holiday



Don't forget the rule of thirds (also from a previous photo tip). Rather than placing your subjects in front of the Christmas tree, move them slightly to one side. If shooting the dinner table set for the holiday feast, have the host stand at one side of the table about 1/3 of the way from the end, rather than centered at the end of the table.

These techniques will help improve your images holiday images. Have a great holiday season, a happy and healthy New Year and remember to have fun with your camera.

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



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Garden Club

We hope to see you at the Holiday Luncheon on Monday, **December 10** at 12:30 p.m. in the Clarion Hotel. There is no meeting in December.

December is still a very colorful time. By using light and lighted ornamentation we enter the winter season with optimism and joy. There are many plants that contribute to the beauty of our surroundings even into deepest winter.

Many evergreen trees and shrubs that are considered dwarf, reaching three or five feet tall and wide. Others conveniently grow only one to two feet. Boxwood comes in varying sizes, as do hollies and Nanina, which will grow in sun or part shade. Andromeda has green or reddish flower buds all winter that bloom with fragrant flowers in the spring. Aucuba Japonica 'Variegata' (Japanese Laurel or Gold Dust Plant) keeps its large green and gold leaves year-round. Winterberry Holly is showy in winter even without leaves as it shows off densely packed, brightly colored red or golden berries on colorful stems which grab our attention against a backdrop of snow. I really enjoy Liriope along my driveway with its variegated yearround leaves and pretty purple flowers in October. The only care they require is pruning back in March to allow for new growth.

House plant benefits: by setting your indoor plants on trays with moistened pebbles you will add humidity for your plants and for your home environment. This is the time to place cactus plants and poinsettias in bright light for best leaf development. To force prechilled bulbs place them in a container with water to just reach the bub bottom and enjoy the pretty blooms.

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
















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
