J. Langreich, Chairperson gave a report for the Administration Committee.

The Board announced the approval of Mary Rose McCarthy as a member to the Administration Committee.

M. Lighthipe, Recreation Director gave a report for the Recreation Department.

COMMUNITY MANAGER'S REPORT: (J. Schultz and J. Snyder)

Reminder to all residents that Daylight Savings Time ends on November 7, 2021 and to change your clocks back an hour. Residents should also test their smoke alarms and carbon monoxide (CO) detector and replace batteries if needed. Fall cleanup is underway, please check the creepers for update as to when the Grounds Department will be in your area. The Association is closed on Thursday, November 11, 2021 for Veterans Day. Garbage pickup for Thursday will be on Wednesday, November 10, 2021. During the presentation of the 2022 budget, Management presented the concept of the Common Area Lighting Project. The Board approved the concept and agreed to begin the funding for the 7-year project. Management is seeking approval to release the funds to purchase the materials needed to begin the first year of the project, this will include upgrading 75 of the 344 street post lights. E. Murphy moved to approve the release of year one funds for the Common Area Lighting Project at a cost not to exceed \$32,304.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3230 - Capital Replacement/Common Buildings. F. Weinstein seconded. There was a brief discussion. A vote was called and all were in favor. Motion carried. J. Snyder provided an update regarding the renovation at Club Encore. Management has been asked to obtain quotes for the replacement of the fully funded equipment in the LVW Fitness Center. It is the recommendation to purchase the replacement equipment from Life Fitness in order to have all the fitness equipment under the same company. This will allow us to obtain repair and maintenance from the same company. Below is the list of the needed equipment and the costs associated with their replacement.

If the Board wishes to move forward with the above equipment, the purchase would be from Life Fitness at a combined cost of \$34,057.88. The expense will be provided by account #3150 Property Fund-Replacements. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on December 1, 2021.

### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

- 1. The Master Deed amendment regarding Capital Expenditures was presented again as attached to the agenda.
- 2. The BOT announced that the Recycling Club has been disbanded due to the decline in funds and no leadership. The Board will vote to transfer the Recycling Funds at the next open Board meeting on December 1, 2021.
- 3. The remote gate entry concept was never implemented as initially proposed July 1, 2020 and voted to accept on August 5, 2020. The vendors failed to provide a workable contract that met the requirements outlines in the RFP. In addition, a major company withdrew from the proposal entirely. The failure has turned out to work in our favor being more beneficial than initially conceived. J. Schultz gave a PowerPoint Presentation regarding the new proposal that will provide enhanced benefits for the members. E. Murphy moved to approve to employ services from Frontsteps and dwellingLIVE with the annual costs of \$11,753.00 provided by the operating budget and to approve to contract with USA Security Service Inc. to install the necessary equipment at a cost not to exceed \$52,000.00. The funds to meet this expense will be provided by account #3230 Capital Replacement/Common Buildings. J. Carmody seconded. There were questions and comments from the audience members. A vote was taken and all were in favor. Motion carried.

### **NEW BUSINESS:**

- 1. Revisions to Specification 1\_1, "Landscaping in the Five-Foot Area" were presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on December 1, 2021.
- 2. Policy Resolution regarding Moratorium on Opening of Newly Paved Streets was presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on December 1, 2021.
- 3. Management presented a solution to the time-consuming task of completing condo questionnaires for prospective buyers and owner refinancing at a workshop meeting on October 20, 2021. Charging a fee for processing these forms is the industry norm, but LVWA has not yet assigned a fee for completion of these forms. Upon recommendation from our accounting software provider, Management contacted HomeWiseDocs. com (HWD) and were provided a demo to determine if this service would be beneficial to LVWA. HWD owns an Internet-accessible software-based automated processing system that processes condo questionnaires for a fee. This fee is built into the fee charged to the lender, and would be split between the provider and LVWA. LVWA's portion of the fee is determined by the BOT. The fee is passed on to the buyer/refinancer as part of the closing process. LVWA would provide the date/documents needed to complete the questionnaires and a lender, upon request, will be directed to the HWD website, and where they will obtain all forms needed, for a fee. As HWD collects the fees from the lenders, they will follow the remittance schedule as outlined in the service agreement to remit funds to LVWA twice a month. Management is proposing and recommending the signing of the service agreement with HomeWiseDocs.com to provide this service for LVWA at no cost to LVWA. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on December 1, 2021.

The next open Board meeting will be held on Wednesday, December 1, 2021 at 1:00 PM in the auditorium at Willow Hall.

There being no further business, the Board meeting adjourned at approximately 8:46 PM.

# **Audience Comments Meeting-November 3, 2021**

### Willow Hall

A brief audience comments period followed the business portion of the open Board meeting at 8:46 PM with residents raising questions or concerns or seeking clarification about a variety of issues.

<u>Resident:</u> S. Baillie from 448B Heather Court thanked the Board of Trustees, Administration and the Maintenance department for their hard work to save the pond on Buckingham Drive.

<u>Response</u>: Management had a meeting with the DEP. If applicable, Management will present to contract to treat the ponds twice a year in order to keep everything under control.

<u>Resident:</u> J. Ritter from 72C Cambridge Circle, a member of the Leisure Village West Westernaires shared a grievance on behalf of the Club. They are appealing the decision made that will allow another chorus to perform the same weekend as the Westernaires. She requested how the decision was made and by who.

<u>Resident:</u> L. Miotto from 972b Thornbury Lane asked when the clubhouses would be accessible during a power outage. She also asked if the Board is considering allowing generators at the units.

<u>Response</u>: There is no plan for a 24/7 coverage for power outage. Management will look at each power outage and length to restore power to determine when and how long to open the Clubhouse. The Architectural Committee is looking into a plan to present to the Board.

<u>Resident:</u> P. Bosco from 762C Liverpool Circle asked if residents are allowed to be paid to perform for a Club.

<u>Response:</u> Yes, it is permitted. To clarify, the Association does not pay or hire a resident to perform for a Club.

<u>Resident:</u> L. Greer from 1150A Thornbury Lane asked the Board to consider storage units for the residents to rent by the Dog Park and mentioned that maintenance is needed on Thornbury Lane.

<u>Resident:</u> B. Genovese from 701B Friar Court, President of the LVW Dance Club mentioned that the Association shut the Club down until January. They submitted a proposal to the Board and never received a response. She heard there was a proposal sent out to all the Clubs by Recreation and she never received one. She also spoke about mask wearing at a Dance event.

<u>Resident:</u> S. Brosonski from 898B Stratford Court, Secretary of the Dance Club spoke about wearing a mask when eating and dancing at an event. She also spoke about the suspension given to the Dance Club. She asked what the policy is regarding a Club advertising for an event on the creepers.

<u>Response:</u> The Board is following the recommendations from the CDC. Due to the Club being suspended until January, the Club is not permitted to use the facilities or advertise for any events.

<u>Resident:</u> S. Tozzi from 820B Liverpool Circle and new President of the Bocce Club thanked the Board for acknowledging that the Bocce Courts are an amenity.

<u>Resident:</u> D. Tucker from 1000A Thornbury Lane spoke about the mask mandates and clarified her statement from the last meeting.

<u>Resident:</u> B. Gilbert from 4A Edinburgh Lane was seeking clarification regarding service animals from the Administration Committee report at the open portion of the Board meeting. She asked the Board questions regarding being vaccinated and wearing a mask verse not wearing a mask.

<u>Response</u>: The Administration Committee is working on a policy for Service Animals and they will be permitted in the Recreation buildings. Public health is paramount and the Board is currently following the CDC guidelines.

Response: No.

Resident: L. Greer from 1150A Thornbury Lane spoke about wearing a mask when doing inspections for the Architectural Committee.

<u>Resident:</u> A.Pedowitz from 1171b Thornbury Lane responded to a previous audience comment regarding the mask mandate.

Resident: J. Joyce from 9B Cambridge Circle asked when the Club Encore kitchen will be available.

Response: There is no set date but will hopefully be open in time for the Holiday.

There being no further comments or questions, the meeting ended at approximately 9:55 PM.

# **Happy New Year**

### **Annual Audit Meeting**

The Board invites you to join us for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2021 audit at Willow Hall, Wednesday, January 26, at 7:00 pm. Skip Bauer of Mohel Bauer &Gass, CPA's will present the audit year in review. After his presentation, the microphone will be open for your questions on the audit. Audits are made available at Willow, Encore, and the Association Office for those who may not have the internet. Copies are also available online on lywcreeper.com.

### **Master Deed Amendment, Almost Time to Vote**

The Board will be kicking off the process to amend the Master Deed at the February Board meeting. Unlike the recent bylaws vote, a master deed vote cannot use a rejection-type ballot. Our Master Deed may only be amended by the members and must achieve an affirmative vote from 2/3rds of the community as a whole. Assuming every one of the 2692 units is occupied, 2/3rds of those units are needed to approve this amendment, or 1,795 "yes votes," a genuinely imposing goal. I know some believe that the recent bylaws amendment lowering the quorum would somehow reduce the requirement to amend our documents, but that is not true, as you can see by the 2/3rds affirmative stipulation.

It has been very disappointing that turnout for a membership vote has been low and seems to be trending lower. We'll need to do something to attract more participation for a vote like the one that's being presented. After all, this is a master deed amendment with an exceptionally high threshold for the hopes of any approval. I think the Board will have to put together something to entice voter participation, some type of random prize for merely sending in a ballot. Of course, we think you should support this proposal on its merit, supporting the eventual capital project this 50-year-old community will surely need in the near future. However, any amendment proposal would rather be ratified or fail by an actual vote count instead of dying on the vine due to apathy. This is your community and your investment, be heard and participate!

## The Printed Directory Is Not Dead Yet

Time to print a new Directory. I think the days of the printed directory are probably waning, but until it fades into obscurity, you need to make any changes to have it show up in the new addition. That's super important as that information stays printed in error for a whole year; there are no do-overs. So if you're looking to fix or add something, get it to us by the end of the month; you'll be happy you did. Once we transition to Frontsteps, the directory online will be so much more accessible to residents; you may never go back to a printed version again. In addition, changes will be instantaneously corrected or added without the process I do every month, admittedly sometimes after some prodding.

#### A Breath of Fresh Air

Some scientific findings are of minimal interest, barely touching our consciousness. Others are more intriguing, having the potential to improve the human condition. But then, perhaps once or twice in a generation, a discovery is so stunning it demands our attention.

That pivotal moment has arrived! It is now conceivable that humans in emergent situations can employ their intestines to breathe.

It has been scientifically shown that orb-weaving spiders, sea cucumbers, loaches, and catfish have evolved the capacity to breathe through their intestines as a survival mechanism in low oxygen environments. But now, as delineated in the journal *Med*, scientists at Tokyo Medical and Dental University have demonstrated that O2-deprived mice, rats, and pigs can withstand hypoxic conditions when their intestinal tissue is oxygenated.

Through a series of highly structured experiments, oxygen was infused into the rectum of these animals in both gaseous and liquid form. Enough O2 was absorbed through the lumen to stabilize each subject and ensure survivability.

Adapting these findings to humans could have enormous implications. Enough oxygen can be





generated in patients suffering from respiratory distress to allow their doctors to diagnose and treat an underlying illness. In those situations where ventilators are at a premium, identifying an alternate way to sustain a patient who is waiting for a ventilator—a scenario played out thousands of times during the Covid pandemic—can save untold numbers of lives!

Will wonders never cease? Through a biological mechanism called parthenogenesis, where embryos develop without benefit of any male contribution, two California Condor chicks have been born.

Genetic analysis derived from a database assembled over thirty years from individual California Condors confirmed that the only DNA shared by these chicks was found in the two female birds that hatched them. Although parthenogenesis has been recorded among domesticated turkeys and chickens, this is the first instance of a "virgin birth" within a cohort of wild condors.

Notwithstanding the astonishing fact that two healthy chicks emerged from eggs that were never fertilized, adding to the number of this critically endangered species (Gymnogyps californianu) is beyond serendipitous: in April 1987, the world's population of California Condors was a mere 27.

As detailed in the October 28 issue of the Journal of Heredity, a collaborative mission executed by the Department of the Interior and San Diego Zoo rescued this species from certain extinction. As of December 2020, there were 504 of these magnificent birds.

# Snowy Images

The cold weather makes it hard to get motivated to go outdoors and shoot, but there are some great photo opportunities to be had in winter.

Even when there is no snow, icy ponds make great subjects. Look for ducks, geese, or seagulls standing on the ice. Ice also makes for great reflection images. Many normal scenes take on a new meaning in the cold of winter

After a snowfall, there are great shots everywhere. The challenge with snow shots is getting the proper exposure. A very bright snowy scene

tricks your camera into thinking there is too much light, so the camera will cut back on exposure. This makes the snow in your images look gray. If you know how to set your exposure compensation, increase the exposure by 1 stop to brighten the snow. If your camera has "scene" modes, use the one for snow or beach.

The bare leafless trees make nice silhouette shots and are very good for black and white photography. They are especially effective with a sunrise or sunset behind them.

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
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
