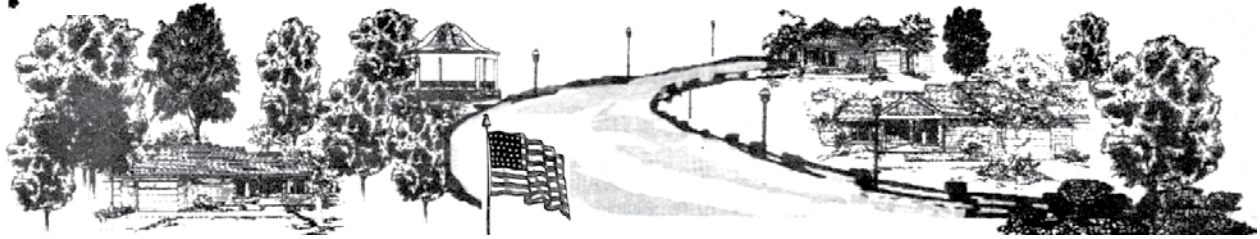

This meeting commenced at approximately 1:05 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

S. Kaufman moved to waive the reading of the minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo moved to approve the April 18, 2018 minutes. S. Falk-Zitelli seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Falk-Zitelli moved to approve the Pool Rules for the 2018 Season with the following revision: the notation regarding umbrellas will be removed. S. Kaufman seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo moved to approve the Access to Records Policy with the following revision: under item B, insert "not under current review" in the first sentence. S. Falk-Zitelli seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

Fiduciary Responsibilities Policy was removed from the agenda for further review.

L. Maiocco moved to approve the Resolution Relating to Election Procedures. S. Kaufman seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Kaufman moved to approve/reaffirm the members of the Election Committee. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Falk-Zitelli moved to place a

temporary moratorium on new clubs/groups until the Activities and Services Committee can review all existing clubs & groups and their schedules. S. Kaufman seconded. F. Weinstein, absent; L. Maiocco, Yes; S. Kaufman, Yes; C. Lupo, No; S. Falk-Zitelli, Yes; S. Tozzi, Yes and E. Baumeister, absent. Motion carried.

Community Manager's Report

Beach Scenes

Its summer time and a great time to get some shots at the beach. On crowded beaches you can shoot the people and activities. On remote beaches you can look for wildlife, patterns in the sand, great cloud formations against the water, and sunrises.

The challenge with beach shots is getting the proper exposure. The bright scene tricks you camera into thinking there is too much light, so the camera will cut back on exposure, therefore you should increase the exposure slightly. If your camera has “scene” modes, use the one for snow or beach.

A great way to enhance your images is using a polarizing filter, which cuts glare the same as polarizing sunglasses. This filter will make the sky in their images darker (and the clouds brighter), it will show the detail in the sand, and to remove the reflections in the water.

When talking of warranties and your HVAC components, in particular, the idea that it can only be service by the company that installed the unit. The text should have remained that this is often "touted" and was edited to say "required" to avoid a warranty issue. This is something that the ad hoc committee is investigating and will hopefully clarify this important issue.

The 2018 - 2019 Budget Presentation

Come join us for the next fiscal budget presentation in Willow Hall on Wednesday, July 25 at 1 p.m. The process always starts with the Finance Committee's yearly review of the reserves, continuing through to the final review with the Committee, Board and staff. The meeting will kick off with a brief overview of the past year and then we'll cover the five fund groups that together make up your budget and monthly maintenance fee. After the presentation, the Board will welcome all questions pertaining to the budget as this is a special meeting for the sole purpose of presenting the budget. We encourage all residents to come and participate in this annual event.

QAM Tuner, what is This?

What the heck is QAM and why do I need to know about it? QAM stands for something you probably don't need to know, **q**uadrature **a**mplitude **m**odulation. It's the format for digitally encoding and transmitting TV signals. Moreover, we're talking about Clear QAM, that the signal that may be provided to you in the clear (unencrypted), giving it the name Clear QAM or TV signals you may receive without a set top box. It may be important to you as the next television provider takes over the reins for our TV service here in the Village.

As you may already know, come October, you'll be receiving one STB or "set top box." Some of you may have more than one TV and will want more than one box to watch TV in other rooms. To get all the channels and enhancements provided under the "Preferred HD" bulk contract, like the on-screen guide, widgets and OnDemand content, you'll need a set top box, requiring an additional monthly expense for each box you may need.

Here's where a TV set with a QAM tuner comes in. If you own a TV set with this type of tuner built in, you may try to hook it up directly to the cable in one of your other rooms, do a channel scan from the setup menu and you might see some local channels. Now, I must caution you that your mileage may vary, as not all tuners work exactly alike and some brands may not work at all. If your set does pick up some channels, it won't be in the same location as the Verizon's STB and you won't get all the features we mentioned above. If it works for you, you'll be able to save some money in the process.

There's much more to talk about down the road, but I hesitate to go over everything in this format. Stay tuned, there's more to come.

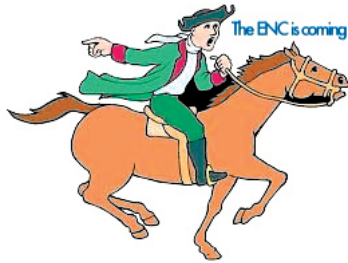

Crochet Soap Sacks



Approximate finished size: 4 x 6 inches. Yarn suggestion: Cotton and/or cotton blend yarns only.

Make a slip knot on hook and chain 5. Join last chain to the first with a slip stitch to form a ring. Round 1: Chain 1, work 12 dc in ring, join with slip stitch. Round 2: (increase): Chain 1, *work 2 dc in next dc, dc in next dc; repeat from * around, join with slip stitch -- you'll have 18 dc. Round 3: (increase): Repeat Round 2 -- you'll have 27 dc. Round 4: Chain 1, dc in each dc around, join with slip st in beginning chain. Rounds 5 - 10: Repeat Round 4. Round 11: Chain 1, sc in each dc around, join with slip st in beginning chain. At the end of Round 11, Chain 14, join end of chain into the edge of the sack with a slip st and fasten off (to form a loop/handle). Weave in ends.

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2019 BUDGET

Dear Fellow Unit Owners:

We cordially invite you to attend the general meeting of unit owners that will be held in Willow Hall at 1 p.m. on Wednesday, **July 25**. At the meeting, we will present the budget for next year and have a period of informal discussion in which you will have the opportunity to comment and ask questions about the budget. A live broadcast will be shown on Channel 15. The meeting will also be recorded and played at a later time.

The proposed budget reflects a \$33 increase per unit per month. This increase is necessary to maintain the level of services and protect the common elements of our community and is being applied to the budget as follows:



The notable increase to the budget this year is the transition from Hotwire to Verizon bulk television services in the Village.

The first payment for the new fiscal year is due October 1, 2018. Maintenance payments paid in full for the fiscal year and by the October 2018 due date will be eligible for a 2% refund. (The refund will apply to payments made by cash or check only. If paid by check, the refund will be issued once your check clears LVWA's bank).

LVWA also offers an automatic payment plan for the payment of your monthly maintenance fees. If you have not yet enrolled, simply fill out the "Authorization Agreement for Preauthorized Payments" on page 9 with the required information and deliver to the Association office. We will withdraw your maintenance fees directly from your bank account *at any bank* on a monthly basis. If you have not signed up for automatic payments, your new monthly payment book will be mailed to you.

You can thank Hedwig Eva Maria Kiesler, an Austrian Immigrant for her part in the development of that marvel. During WWII, German U boats were sinking allied ships due to their ability to guide the torpedoes by using a radio guidance system. Ms. Kiesler took on the problem and conceived a method of constantly changing those frequencies called frequency hopping. She began development of her theory along with an associate named George Anthiel who proposed using punched paper tape to switch between 88 different frequencies. They secured a patent in 1942 and presented it to the U.S. Navy who initially turned it down then confiscated it claiming her Austrian Citizenship made her a possible "enemy of the state." That one innovation formed the basis for GPS, Wi Fi and Blue Tooth which now represent a combined market value of some \$30 billion. Ms. Kiesler never received a dime.

Before you begin to feel too sorry for Ms. Kiesler you might want to consider the name she used as an actress, Hedy Lamarr. You might also want to consider that her first love was science and technology and that, despite being deprived of the rewards she should have reaped from her inventions she continued her loyalty to her adopted country by selling war bonds in the amount of \$300 million in today's dollars while continuing to develop new innovations used today in a wide variety of fields.

So next time you are lost at sea think of Hedy and maybe you will find yourself marooned on a desert isle with her. Of course, now, she would be over a hundred years old but she was still a movie star.

Monarch Butterflies



Who hasn't watched in wonder as a butterfly flutters from flower to flower revealing colorful patterns on delicate wings? The Monarch butterfly is one of the most striking in appearance in our part of the country. These creatures also have a fascinating life story, which was the topic of the April Nature Club meeting, presented by Mary Lenahan, a teacher and nature enthusiast.

The monarch spends about a month going through the changes from egg, to larva (caterpillar), to pupa (chrysalis) and finally adult butterfly. Eggs are laid on milkweed leaves because the caterpillars feed only on milkweed.

The annual migration of North America's monarch butterfly is an amazing phenomenon. The eggs laid by Monarchs returning north in the spring produce adults who will only live another 2-6 weeks. Successive generations continue the journey north until environmental cues tell them to travel south for the winter. Some fly as far as 3,000 miles to reach their winter home in the Sierra Madre Mountains of Mexico. The Monarchs that migrate south live all

winter, or about six to nine months. Monarchs roost for the winter in oyamel fir forests, clustering together to stay warm. Tens of thousands of monarchs can cluster on a single tree.

The monarch butterfly, once common across the United States, could soon end up on the Endangered Species List. Monarchs have declined by 90 percent in the past 20 years. Factors associated with the decline include loss of habitat due to elimination of milkweed, related to genetically engineered crops and the use of herbicides; loss of winter habitat due to logging and land clearing in Mexico; global climate change with increased risk of drought, heat waves and severe storms.

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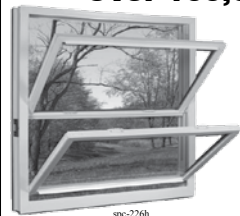

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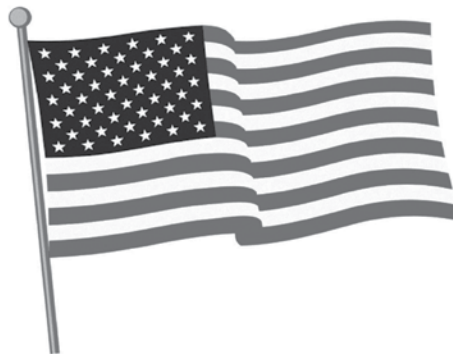

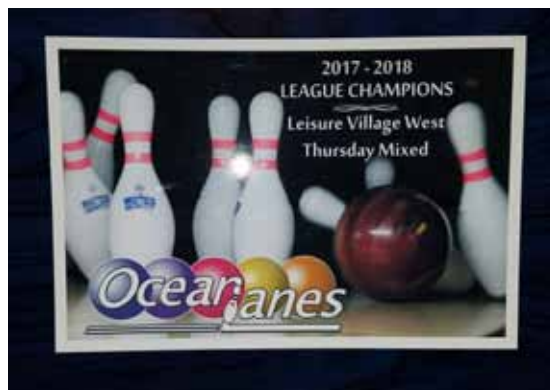

Leisure Village West Willows & Pines Golf Courses Regulations



For the enjoyment of the game of golf and for the proper care and maintenance of the golf courses the following regulations will apply.

Golf courses officially open at 8 a.m. from April to October unless otherwise posted. Players must be 16 years of age. Children and pets are not permitted anywhere on the golf course including sand traps and greens.

General Rules:

1. Residents and guests must wear appropriate badges. Residents must accompany guests.
2. Metal spike golf shoes are not allowed.
3. All players and guests must sign in for each 9 holes. No more than a foursome may play in a group. Tee off is in order of sign-in.
4. Each player must have a minimum of 2 clubs, one of which must be a putter.
5. All play begins on the first hole. Ball must be teed-up on all holes between the markers and no farther back than two club lengths.
6. The second hole tee box must be cleared of players before teeing off from the first tee on both courses. The ninth tee box at the Willows must be cleared of players before teeing off from the eighth tee.
7. Flag sticks and equipment must be kept off the greens.
8. All players must replace divots, rake sand traps, and repair ball marks on the green. Please repair you mark and one other, if necessary, to maintain the integrity of the course.
9. Out of Bounds: Areas outside the white markers and sidewalks are out of bounds. Place ball inbounds at a point where it left the fairway.

Please Note:

Practice putting green: A putter only is allowed. No chipping or pitching on to the green.

Tournaments: Special rules are set forth by the tournament sponsors.

Revised and approved May 2, 2018. Supersedes all previous swimming pool rules.

The official opening is Friday, **May 25** for the Willow and Encore pools. Both the Willow and Encore pools will remain open until Sunday, **September 9** (weather permitting and subject to the availability of lifeguards).

NO SWIMMING UNLESS LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY

POOL HOURS:	Willow Pool	11 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday – Friday 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. weekends & holidays
	Encore Pool	10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily <i>Starting July 1: Extra swim hour, Encore pool will close at 9 p.m.</i>
	Aquacisers	10 to 11 a.m. Monday through Friday at Willow Pool Only (NO CLASSES on Holidays or Weekends)
	Lap Lanes	Residents must yield to lap lane swimmers
	Adult Guests	(Accompanied by a resident) Regular pool hours as listed above.
	Youth Guests	4 to 14 years of age (Accompanied by a resident) 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Encore Pool & Pool Area 4 to 7 p.m. at Willow Pool & Pool Area

Youth guests under 4 years of age are not permitted in either pool.

In the event of the closing of one pool; the youth guest hours are as follows at the opened pool: 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4 to 7 p.m. A 20-minute grace period will be allowed for children to exit the pool area at the end of the children's swim hours. Children are not allowed in the pool area at any time other than designated youth hours. Children 10 years of age and under must be accompanied by a parent or grandparent for the entire time they are in the water.

Badges: Members without guests must present their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the monitor stand before admittance to the pool area.

Members with guests must present their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the monitor stand. Members with guests will be required to sign in upon arrival and sign out upon departure. Member's guests will be issued a disposable wristband for the day. Guests must surrender their wristband before leaving the pool area for the day and may only return with a member.

Guests: Up to (4) adult or youth guests are permitted and **MUST** be accompanied by a **RESIDENT** who must **REMAIN** with guests and have the appropriate wristbands at all times.

- Attire:** Proper swim attire must be worn from home to pool since changing area is limited. Cut-off jeans are not allowed in the pool. A cover-up wrap is needed when entering the clubhouses. The Association is not responsible for any discoloration of bathing suits due to pool chemicals. Street shoes are not allowed in the pool. Do not leave shoes or slippers at the pool steps.
- Diapers:** Only diapers specially designed for immersion in water are permitted.
- Safety:** No diving or jumping is allowed at either pool and will be strictly enforced. No sitting or standing on pool steps. Residents and guests may sit on steps where indicated at the Encore Pool. Weather related closures are at the discretion of the lifeguard. The lifeguard will determine when to reopen the pool. Lifeguards do remain on duty during rain.
- Swim Aids:** No floats, toy surfboards or swim toys are permitted in the pool with the exception of noodles. Noodles are not to exceed two per person. Mesh seat noodles are also acceptable. Swimsuits that incorporate a flotation device as part of the suit construction are allowed. Swimmies are allowed. Residents are permitted to use therapeutic aquatic belts. Coast Guard approved life vests are also permitted.
- Health:** **Persons with open wounds are not permitted in either pool or Jacuzzi at any time. Lifeguards will enforce this rule.**
- Food:** Food and beverages are permitted in the pool area. No glass or other similar containers that might cause personal injuries if broken are permitted in the pool areas. **No alcoholic beverages are permitted in the pool areas.** Tables and surrounding area are to be left clean.
- Smoking:** Neither smoking nor vaping are permitted within 25 feet of the pool area. Please use designated areas.
- Lounges, Chairs, Tables:** Lounges, chairs or tables are not to be reserved with a towel, etc. **When leaving the pool area chairs and lounges are to be returned to their proper places.**
- Showers:** Bathers are required to shower before entering the pools. If water shoes are worn please rinse before entering the pool.
- Jacuzzi:** Residents are to read and follow rules posted at the Jacuzzi. **No one under the age of 16 is allowed in the Jacuzzi.**
- Music:** Please use headphones where possible, otherwise be considerate and keep the volume down as not to disturb fellow members.

Cooking Club

Summer is upon us. The pools are open. The butterflies, bees and ants are out and about. BBQ's are ramping up. Happy Fourth!

Barbecue, BBQ, Barbie or Bar-B-Que. No matter how you say it or spell it, the BBQ made its way into the American cuisine and American hearts from the Caribbean. When the Spanish first landed in the Caribbean, they witnessed the natives cooking their pork over a slow cook fire of green wood, smoking the meat for a long time. As the cooking style made its way up north, four distinct ways to prepare the meat and the kind of meat became apparent.

In Texas, where there were plenty of cattle, the meat best suited for the BBQ of course is beef. Even in Texas there are four different ways to make mouth-watering BBQ. Eastern, Western, Southern and Central. Eastern Texans prefer a sweet tomato-based sauce cooked over hickory wood until the meat falls off the bone. Western style is cooked over mesquite wood directly in the heat. Southern style uses thick, molasses-like sauces keeping the meat moist. Central Texans like to rub a mixture of salt and black pepper while cooking over indirect heat from the pecan, oak, or mesquite wood.

The Carolinas prefer their meat more on the white side, as in pig. North Carolinians and most of northeast America use the style of basting their meat to preserve the juices, a technique brought over with the British colonists. South Carolinians use a mustard-based sauce influenced by their German and French immigrants. Both tend to use the Caribbean style of smoking slowly over an open fire.

Memphis barbecue stems from the availability of a variety of goods sailing up the Mississippi, including molasses. They mixed the sweet taste of molasses with a tomato based sauce. This gave them a sweet, juicy tasting pork. Kansas City barbecue uses the sweet spicy taste of Memphis and includes not only pork, but also beef and chicken.

Whatever your favorite style of BBQ, don't forget the sides. Coleslaw, cob corn, beans, chips and of course the veggies! Have a great summer!

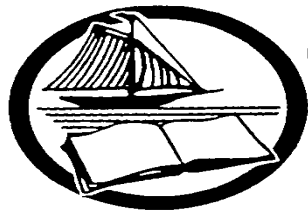

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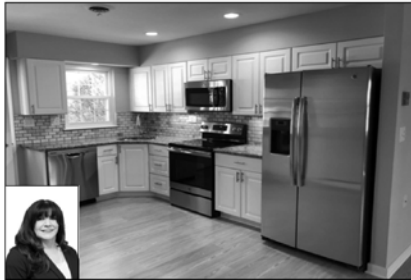

There is a 24/7 coverage and they go to four area hospitals. Caroline said they are very thankful for the donations of this and past years and they are fortunate that they were able to get volunteers so that they don't have to pay them.

Amy Bozooijen of Hope Center said that because of donations from groups like ours, they were able to help 12,523 men, women and children consisting of 4,512 families, by provide pounds of food and gift cards. In addition to having a food pantry, they assist in paying electric and water bills. Hotel housing in emergencies is also provided.

Simone Tellini of POAC (Parents of Autistic Children) said autism has risen in New Jersey. POAC has workshops and training to help a person deal with autism. Police officers are specially trained to find lost children.

I had to announce that the October Card Party was canceled due to scheduling difficulties but we hope to have it in late April. The success of the Caritas Guild parties is what makes it possible to distribute checks to area charities so when you are called on to volunteer to help, canvas businesses for gift certificates or donate prizes, please respond resoundingly!

If you always wondered about the origin of the Caritas Guild and how wonderful our members are and were, at the May meeting we watched a video of Marie Wilcox interviewing Janet and I as previously shown on KLVW-TV, Leisure Village West's TV station.
