Board of Trustees Meeting – March 6, 2019

Present were L. Maiocco, C. Lupo, E. Murphy, F. Weinstein, S. Falk-Zitelli, and S. Tozzi. Also present were Community Manager – J. Schultz, Service Manager – J. Snyder, and Accounting Administrator – M. O'Connor. Absent were A. Damato and Recreation Director – M. Lighthipe.

This meeting commenced at approximately 7:00 pm with the pledge of allegiance.

ITEMS VOTED ON:

F. Weinstein moved to waive the reading of the minutes. E. Murphy seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

F. Weinstein moved to approve the February 20, 2019 minutes. S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo moved to approve the revised Policy, "Control Gate Entry". E. Murphy seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

J. Schultz, Community Manager gave a report for the Recreation Department.

COMMUNITY MANAGER REPORT:

J. Snyder stated that as the PVC trim project develops and progresses it has been determined that there is a need to have an aerial lift in order to safely and productively remove and replace the upper portions of the trim along with reaching the heights of the chimney tops. He went out to bid for a Nifty Lift TM34 which is a very mobile and versatile trailer mount lift that has retractable axles that allow it to pass through a 3ft 7in wide opening, allowing to get in between units when needed. The following are the quotes received:

It is his recommendation to purchase a TM-34 Nifty Lift from Atlantic Aerials for a cost of \$21,256.16. This expense will be provided by account #3151-Equipment Additions. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on April 3, 2019.

J. Schultz stated that a pharmacy was interested in renting the vacant office at 3B Buckingham Drive but has since notified the Association they are no longer interested due to them not finding a pharmacist. The Board is looking into other avenues to rent the space.

There was no unfinished business.

Resident: W. Dylewski expressed his concerns with the rejection ballot.

Response: The Board has distributed and discussed all the information at open Board meetings regarding the rejection ballot since October 2018 and additional information was published in the LVW magazine.

Resident: Y. Fish feels a Board member should not leave during the audience comment period. She asked if the revisions in the revised Policy, "Control Gate Entry" are for residents only.

Response: If a Board member leaves during the audience comment period they are excused with prior notice to the Board President. The revised policy is for Residents only.

Resident: A. Pedowitz spoke about the process for the rejection ballot.

Resident: Y. Fish stated she was given a standard remote control by Verizon FIOS in the beginning of the installation process. She asked that since they started to give out the voice activated remote controls towards the end of the installation process in the village, if she could now have one for free.

Response: She may bring this to the attention of Verizon at the Town Hall meeting on March 20th.

Resident: I. DePasquale asked if the Board has looked into a group pricing for First Alert. **Response**: The Board can look into this.

Resident: T. Ferrell mentioned that it was previously stated that the Association did not provide a stamp on the return envelope for the rejection ballot in order to save money. He asked if this will be the same procedure for the Trustee election. He also mentioned that the election Chairperson has not spoken to the residents in regards to how the rejection ballots will be secured or totaled.

Response: The election process has not been discussed yet for this year's Trustee election.

Resident: N. Haythorn mentioned that the resident wanting the voice activated remote can use Alexa.

There being no further comments or questions, the meeting ended at approximately 7:40 pm.

Pools and Exemptions

Here we are again making last minute changes to our position regarding lifeguards for our pools. The confusion started in January 2018, in when the state made a change to the bathing code. At that time a rule was made for pools over 2,000 square feet requiring two lifeguards. In addition, the rule stated that these lifeguards would not be permitted to have any other task, such as badge checking. Their sole responsibility was to watch over the pools. We could file to be exempt and not have lifeguards at all, providing that we have the proper signage stating that you are swimming at your own risk. No option was available to have any number of lifeguard(s) once you filed to be exempt. The rules were revised again in April of 2018 allowing a "specially exempt" facility to have a lifeguard, if they choose to. Nevertheless, the Board decided last year to have two lifeguards at each pool and not file for exemption. This year the state made yet another minor change allowing the lifeguards to do other menial tasks.

So, with the rules bending slightly, we felt confident we could operate our pools under the exemption, and provide at least one lifeguard as the law now allows, but this was not as easy as it seemed. The state law provides a facility to file for exemption and use only one lifeguard or choose to use none. Under liability laws this doesn't speak to the contradiction that we would be setting having one lifeguard for a pool when the state declares two are needed because of the square footage of our pools. This all comes down to liability risk and our attorney advised us, in his opinion, our plan would present a greater difficulty should we need to defend our choice.

We all know pools have a certain amount of extra liability and is why for many years, without question, we have provided guards. Going exempt, without guards is desirable by some residents, and the Board did contemplate going that way, but they certainly struggled when they considered children's use of the pool. Ultimately it was decided, for this year, we will have lifeguards, but this discussion will continue.

What's your take on this, what would you do? Is there a solution that would be acceptable? Would you ever consider having one pool exempt, where no children can swim at that pool and one pool with lifeguards and all the children's hours? Something to think about for the 2020 season.

Reminder to Check Your Air-Conditioner

Most of you will not experience startup troubles with your air-conditioner, but some will. You can avoid the discomfort of finding out it's not working, on the hottest day of the summer by checking it early. It is true, that it needs to be warm outside to check if the unit is working at its optimum performance, however there's a few things we can check now even when it's cold outside.

The problems we can discover early have little to do with the freon in the system or the performance. Startup troubles can include bad contactors, thermostats, condensing fan motors, capacitors and such, all components of the air-conditioner systems. These are items that can prevent your system from starting this season and are an easy fix with services we provide.

Please check your system early to avoid any inconvenience and discomfort. If your system is working properly, remember on the hottest days, to start cooling your house before the heat gets unbearable as it will take time to recover. You should also close blinds, shut off unneeded appliances and lights, use washers, dryers and cook during cooler parts of the day.



The area covered by VISTON is limited to within a tenmile radius of Leisure Village West. Please note: Drivers DO NOT accept any payment for their services; however, all donations to VISTON are greatly appreciated.

Willow Lake Boating Rules

Leisure Village West Association boats are available for use under the following conditions. Boats are available for use from April 15 through October 15.

1. Each boat *must* be restricted to four passengers, of which not more than two are adults.

2. Each boat occupant *must* wear a life jacket when in a boat. Life jackets are kept in the Gazebo on the pier.

3. Boats *must* be docked and entered from the shore line, *not* from the dock.

4. Boating is restricted to daylight hours.

5. Upon return, boats are to be pulled out of the water onto shore. Oars are to be placed inside boat. Life jackets are to be returned to specified area of Gazebo.

6. Guests under 6 years of age are not permitted in the boats. Guests from 6 to 16 years of age *must* be accompanied by an adult.

7. All guests *must* be accompanied by a resident.

8. No swimming or wading in any body of water other than the Village pools.

9. No standing in boats.

10. No one shall go out in a boat alone.

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Leisure Village West Willows & Pines Golf Course Regulations



For the enjoyment of the game of golf and for the proper care and maintenance of the golf courses, the following regulations will apply:

Golf courses officially open at 8:00 a.m. from April to October unless otherwise posted. <u>*Players must be 16 years of age.*</u> Children and pets are not permitted anywhere on the golf course including sand traps and greens.

General Rules:

- 1. Residents and guests must wear appropriate badges. Residents must accompany guests.
- 2. Metal spike golf shoes are not allowed.

3. All players and guests must sign in for each 9 holes. No more than a foursome may play in a group. Tee off is in order of sign-in.

- 4. Each player must have a minimum of 2 clubs, one of which must be a putter.
- 5. All play begins on the first hole. Ball must be teed-up on all holes between the markers and no farther back than two club lengths.
- 6. The <u>second</u> hole tee box must be cleared of players before teeing off from the first tee on both courses. The ninth tee box at the Willows must be cleared of players before teeing off from the eighth tee.

7. Flag sticks and equipment must be kept off the greens.

8. <u>All players must replace divots, rake sand traps, and repair ball marks on the green</u>. Please repair your mark and one other, if necessary, to maintain the integrity of the course.

9. Out of bounds: Areas outside the white markers and sidewalks are out of bounds. Place ball inbounds at the point where it left the fairway.

Please Note:

<u>Practice putting green</u>: A putter only is allowed. No chipping or pitching on to the green. <u>Tournaments</u>: Special rules are set forth by the tournament sponsors.

Maintenance Schedule:

Pines & Willows course: Closed <u>only when spraying</u>. Watch channel 1970 creeper and lvwcreeper.com for spray dates.

Course maintenance will continue while play is in progress. Please cooperate with the workers.

Youth guests under 4 years of age are not permitted in either pool.

In the event of the closing of one pool; the youth guest hours are as follows at the opened pool - 11 -1 pm and 4 - 7pm. A 20-minute grace period will be allowed for children to exit the pool area at the end of the children's swim hours. Children are not allowed in the pool area at any time other than designated youth hours. Children 10 years of age and under must be supervised by a parent or grandparent for the entire time they are in the water.

Unsupervised children will be asked to leave the pool. Roughhousing and horseplay will not be tolerated.

POOL ENTRY:

Members must swipe their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the pool gate in order to obtain admittance to the pool area.

GUESTS: Up to (4) adult or youth guests are permitted and MUST be accompanied by a RESIDENT who must REMAIN with guests at all times.

- ATTIRE: Proper swim attire must be worn from home to pool since changing area is limited. Cutoff jeans are not allowed in the pool. A cover-up wrap is needed when entering the clubhouses. The Association is not responsible for any discoloration of bathing suits due to pool chemicals. Street shoes are not allowed in the pool. DO NOT LEAVE SHOES OR SLIPPERS AT THE POOL STEPS.
- **DIAPERS:** Only diapers specially designed for immersion in water are permitted.
- **SAFETY:** NO DIVING OR JUMPING IS ALLOWED AT EITHER POOL AND WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED. NO SITTING OR STANDING ON POOL STEPS UNLESS WHERE INDICATED AT THE ENCORE POOL. Weather related closures are at the discretion of the lifeguard. The lifeguard will determine when to reopen the pool. Lifeguards do remain on duty during rain.
- **SWIM AIDS:** NO floats, toy surfboards or swim toys are permitted in the pool with the exception of noodles. Noodles are not to exceed two per person. Mesh seat noodles are also acceptable. Swimsuits that incorporate a flotation device as part of the suit construction along with swimmies are allowed. Residents are permitted to use therapeutic aquatic belts. Coast Guard approved life vests are also permitted.

HEALTH: PERSONS WITH OPEN WOUNDS ARE NOT PERMITTED IN EITHER POOL OR JACUZZI AT ANY TIME. LIFEGUARDS WILL ENFORCE THIS RULE.

- FOOD: Food and beverages are permitted in the pool area. NO GLASS OR OTHER SIMILAR CONTAINERS THAT MIGHT CAUSE PERSONAL INJURIES IF BROKEN ARE PERMITTED IN THE POOL AREAS. NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ARE PERMITTED IN THE POOL AREAS. Tables and surrounding area are to be left clean.
- **SMOKING:** Neither smoking nor vaping are permitted within 25ft of the pool area. Please use designated areas.
- **LOUNGES:** Lounges, chairs or tables are not to be reserved with a towel, etc.

CHAIRS, TABLES: When leaving the pool area chairs and lounges are to be returned to their proper places.

- **SHOWERS:** Bathers are required to shower before entering the pools. If water shoes are worn please rinse before entering the pool.
- JACUZZI: Residents are to read and follow rules posted at the Jacuzzi. No one under the age of 16 is allowed in the Jacuzzi.
- **MUSIC:** Please use headphones where possible, otherwise be considerate and keep the volume down as not to disturb fellow members.

Smartphones – Tablets – Smart Home Devices

The workshops are open forum with questions and answers covering PC's (Windows & Mac), smartphones (Android & iPhone), tablets, Alexa, Echo, Siri and much more. Remember to bring your questions and devices.

The general meeting will be held on Tuesday, **May 14** at 10 am in Club Encore. Our guest presenter is Dr. Chana Lerner from HeartUSA in Toms River. Smartphones can be extremely helpful in keeping track of medical information. On an iPhone, use the



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health app which is designated by a red heart icon to track activity such as steps walked and keep lab records. You can also use the medical ID section to enter your medical information and emergency contacts. The app also gives you the ability to signal for emergency services.

Some added features when combined with an Apple Watch 4 include tracking your heart rate and using the Cardiogram App to aid in A-Fib detection. Other peripherals such as blood pressure devices will connect and store information for review by a physician. Stay tuned as new applications are coming daily that can aid in our health and wellness. Having a difficult time keeping track of all your medications? Drugs.com is a free website and app for both Android and iPhones. It helps manage your prescription drugs and provides important details of most medications, such as side effects, conflicts with other medications and much more.

Manchester Township's Energy Aggregation Program UPDATE

Due to Manchester Township's current Energy Aggregation contract ending on June 30, 2019, the Township recently went out to bid for a new third party energy provider who could offer electric at a lower rate than JCP&L.

Unfortunately, due to current market conditions, the Township did not receive any bids that the Mayor and Council felt would provide the residents ample savings on their electric bills.

Since the last energy contract was so successful, saving residents in the program an aggregate of \$2.5 million over the life of the contract, the Mayor and Council will continue to monitor the markets to prepare to go out to bid in the near future. Until then, residents in the energy aggregation program will be returned to JCP&L as their energy provider on July 1, 2019, without any action needed to be taken by the residents.

If and when we do secure a new contract with a third party energy provider, residents who were in the previous energy aggregation program will be automatically opted back in.


Please note: we do not recycle plastic bags. Plastic bags must be separated from the recycling and thrown out. Please do not leave extra bags for us to dispose of.

• Bring binoculars. If you do not have these, others will share.


- Step away from the group to answer the telephone. Don't:



Time For Planting!

Gardening: April and May are truly busy times in the garden – spring has arrived and the garden is ready to welcome growing perennials and planting annuals.

• Fertilizing evergreens: hollies, azaleas and rhododendrons with Holly Tone; peonies and roses with a handful of bone meal. To avoid black spot spray with neem oil.

• Plant deciduous trees, evergreens, and shrubs soon before it gets too warm.

• Prune early spring flowering shrubs right after they have bloomed: forsythia, lilac, azalea, rhodos, and mountain laurel.

• Dig and divide early blooming perennials when foliage is 3"- 4" above the ground and plant summer blooming annuals after the last frost date (between May 5 and May 10 in Ocean County).
