



# **Board of Trustees Meeting – Aug 1, 2018**

Present were S. Tozzi, C. Lupo, S. Falk-Zitelli, S. Kaufman and F. Weinstein. Also present were Community Manager J. Schultz, Service Manager J. Snyder, Accounting Administrator M. O'Connor and Recreation Manager, Mary Lighthipe. L. Maiocco was absent.

This meeting commenced at approximately 1 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

Manchester Township Police Chief Lisa Parker, Captain Todd Mallon and Traffic Safety Officer Antonio Ellis, made an appearance to explain to residents different areas of Emergency Services. Chief Parker discussed how calls to 911 get routed, and if available, the Volunteer First Aid is dispatched first but if they have no one available, the paid service ambulances are then dispatched. Other topics discussed were: The Safety Equipment and Training policy all volunteers need to go through, the opiate epidemic in Ocean County and what is being done to intervene in the epidemic such as #notevenonce and the Blue Heart Program, which allows an individual to walk in to a Police station on a certain day and receive the drug treatment they need with no cost. It is every Wednesday in Manchester. She informed residents that the "Night Out" Community Reach program will be held on Friday, August 24, 2018 at the Assembly of God Church. Resources will be available to people who need help. Manchester Township currently has two (2) canine dogs. There is also a new mapping system in place to help Officers locate residences.

Traffic Safety Officer Antonio Ellis discussed speeding in the Village and

suggested possibly using a message board to make people aware to slow down.

S. Falk-Zitelli moved to waive the reading of the minutes. S. Kaufman seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Kaufman moved to approve the July 18, 2018 corrected minutes. S. Falk-Zitelli seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo made a motion to purchase, for Willow Hall, a Generac 130KW, 3 Phase, 277/408 Volt generator, model #QT13068KNAC and Transfer Switch, model #RTSN600K3, including installation and permits, for a total cost not to exceed \$55,000.00. This expense will be charged to GL#3230-Capital Replacement-Common Buildings. The unaudited balance for GL#3230 as of 6/30/18 is \$1,307,396.98. S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

F. Weinstein made a motion to adopt the Operating Budget, Reserve Funding and Maintenance Fee Schedules for FYE 9/30/19, as presented at the Open Meeting on July 25, 2018. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

#### **Community Manager's Report**

Community Manager J. Schultz informed residents that the Community Services Committee was resolved by the BOT today in the closed meeting and will be presented at the next meeting.

Community Manager J. Schultz updated residents on the Verizon install. He stated there have been 359 units completed since they began around the second week of July. We will be putting pressure on to ramp up the installs so everyone is enabled by October. He also reminded residents again not to call Verizon unless they have already received the door hanger, as this is slowing down the install.

Service Manager J. Snyder discussed the stage lighting in Willow Hall. Currently, it's a complicated computer based system and it is hard to get volunteers to operate it. The BOT has asked Howard to research

a not so complicated system. An Ad Hoc Committee researched and Howard has recommended purchasing the ETC CS40 lighting console from Hayden Production Services for a total purchase price of \$2,302.53. This expense will be charged to GL#3150-PropertyFund-Replacements. This is the first read and will be part of the next agenda.

Community Manager J. Schultz discussed the bids on the new company wide phone system and some of the features. He stated the recommendation is to contract with Voixis Communications for a premise based company-wide phone system. The cost is \$13,054.00. This expense will be charged to GL#3150-Property Fund-Replacements. The information will be provided at the next meeting.

Mary Lighthipe gave the Recreation report.

#### **Unfinished Business**

The BOT has decided to suspend the pool monitors for the remainder of the season.

There was no new business.

The business meeting was adjourned at 2:07 p.m.

# **HVAC Changes in Club Encore**

By the time you read this, hopefully all work to renovate Club Encore's HVAC system has been successfully completed. The craft court area was the first phase that was completed and what a noticeable change it made. Admittedly, we've only experienced the cooling season thus far, so we'll have to wait until we have some time during the heating season to give a final analysis.

The craft court area, recently referred to as the west wing, is now being heated and cooled with multiple heat pumps giving us a lot more control than was originally comprised by two antiquated units. The kitchen and atrium are also complete and have been converted to a heat pump. This alone represents a massive change to that building. The last phase will include the auditorium, stage and lobby, which will have a more conventional system comparable to Willow Hall with an outside package unit, gas fired hot air and ducted into the building along with a conventional split AC system.

This conversion dramatically changes the resource demand of the building and I'm curious to see how this affects the economics of Encore. Not to mention, if the Board approves the addition of a solar voltaic system, now under consideration and how that will impact the results. Again, I'm curious to see how that may have changed the dynamics of the system design as it was anticipated to cover about 70% of the electric costs, which now may be a tad better.

With the HVAC problem out of the way, the Board may now resume the prospects of renovating the auditorium, to give it a more modern look and feel, so stay tuned.

# The New Fiscal Year and You

Well, it should not come as a surprise to anyone that your maintenance fee was increased by \$33 per month, with \$30 attributed to the bulk TV agreement now with Verizon Fios. I know there's much confusion, especially for those residents who may not be installed as of yet. I also know, nobody wants to pay for something they don't have yet, but we made the decision to charge and credit those who are not installed, until they are. This is an unfortunate accounting problem, but it will help us work through the Verizon bill a little more cleanly. To be clear, this will only be for a few months until January, at which time, we'll have to pay for all 2692 units in the Village. Please understand, we receive one Verizon bill, containing a list of all the addresses and installation dates which show a prorated charge that varies from unit to unit. Armed with this information, we'll adjust those who may have been installed with their unique prorated amount or fully credit those who are not on the bill. Come January, the list will cease and the bill will be in its final arrangement, without any exceptions. We thank you for complying with this arrangement.

# Verizon and Snowbirds

Two separate issues here. If you are leaving before you are eligible to order services, you are still entitled to one free install when you return. However, you are obligated to contribute to the \$30 bulk services by January, so your maintenance fee will not be adjusted after December, when no unit may be exempt.

If you're already installed before going away, don't forget that you can suspend the additional services you may have until your return for a \$50 fee. Simply call Verizon at 1-800-501-1172 to suspend your service. Remember, you cannot suspend the \$30 bulk portion of your maintenance fee, just your additional services, like telephone or internet. That should do it for you Snowbirds, so have a great winter and we'll see you in the spring.

#### **Preparing Your Pets for Emergencies**

Pets are very important members of our families and they can also be affected during emergency situations. It is just as important to have an emergency plan for them as

well as ourselves. Here are a few tips to help prepare your pet during an emergency.

Protect your pet. Animals sense severe weather changes and isolate themselves. Bringing them indoors early can prevent them from running away.

Update your pet's ID tags and ensure they are securely fastened to their collar. If possible include your address and phone number. Should they become lost it will be their ticket home.

Identify shelters before a disaster happens. Some shelters do not allow pets. Check with your town's Office of Emergency Management, boarding kennels or friends and relatives. Be sure to have updated medical and vaccination records readily available.

Prepare a pet kit to include water, food, medical records and other pet supplies that may be needed.

For the past five years, since Hurricane Sandy, the LVW Reveres have been prepared and ready to notify residents of important emergency information should all other means of communication fail. As a result of changes such as residents moving, illness, etc some areas in our Village do not have a dedicated Revere. #### What's Important?

New Medicare cards that are headed your way. Medicare is mailing millions of new cards with the new numbers. Everyone who receives this benefit will get one; your benefits will stay exactly the same. So here are some thoughts from the US Department of Health and Human Services that may answer your questions:


Something is different? Yes, Social Security numbers have been removed.

What do I have to do? Nothing they will arrive automatically by mail. Remember Medicare will never call you for personal information, so beware of scams.

When will they come? If you haven't received one yet check the Medicare.gov website/new card to see when the cards are expected in our area. You can even sign up for an email about it.

My friend got one, where is mine? It takes about a month for everyone within a mailing area to get their cards. My new card is here, so now what? When your new card arrives, destroy the old one. You can use your new card right away so bring it to your next appointment.

# Arts & Crafts Club

Welcome autumn! Fall is opening its doors and it's time to get your mug cozy for hot chocolates on those cold days and nights. Below is an easy pattern for a mug/cup cozy. It is knit with a crochet leaf embellishment. See you at our October meetings. Happy Crafting!

Dates to remember include upcoming meetings on **October 4**, **18**, **November 1** and **15** at 1 p.m. in the Leisure Fair Clubhouse. Our Holiday Sale is **November 9** in Willow Hall from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

#### Fall Cozy Mug Cover with Leaves

Fits mug 3 1/2" dia. on top, 2" dia. on bottom, 4 1/2" high. Skills: Beginner Knit & Crochet. Materials: Knitting Needles: 6mm/ US 10; Crochet Hook: 3.25mm/D; Yarn Needle; Button 1" long. Yarn: Worsted (2 colors) Color A (for cozy) suggestion: white or beige. Color B (for leaf) suggestion: orange, green or brown

Gauge for Cozy: 16 sts = 4''; 24 rows = 4'' In Stockinette st.

Instructions: Cozy (Worked from bottom to top). With yarn A, Cast on 42 sts on Knitting Needles. Row 1 - Row 2: Knit. Work piece in stockinette st until piece measures  $3 \frac{1}{2''}$  long from cast on row. Next 2

rows: Knit. (each row). Bind off. With crochet hook in the loop left, ch 25, Sl st 2 rows below, this makes the button loop. Fasten off. Hide ends.


Leaf (Make 3) Foundation row: With yarn B and crochet hook, ch 24 plus one starting ch.

Row 1: 1 Sl st in 2nd, 3rd and 4th ch from hook, 1 hdc in each of next 2 ch, \*1 dc in next ch, 1 tr in each of next 2 ch, ch 2, 1 sc in next ch\*\*, ch 2, rep from \* to \*\*, (1 sc, 1 hdc, 1 dc, 1 tr, ch 2, 1 hdc, 1 sc) in last ch, continue working on other side of foundation row, 1 sc in next ch, ch 2, 1 tr in each of next 2 ch, 1 dc in next ch, 1 sc in next ch, ch 2, 1 tr in each of next 2 ch, 1 dc in next ch, 1 hdc in next ch, Sl st in next ch, ch 1, turn.

Row 2: sc around edges of leaf, ch 3 at the top of each pointy part of the leaf (five points in total). End this row by joining a Sl st to hdc. Fasten off. Weave in ends. Attach to right side of cozy, evenly spaced.

Fold Right Side of piece together and hold the bottom together.

With Crochet Hook, sc the bottom together up to 4 sts (You can also sew the bottom instead of working sc). Turn cover to the right side and sew the button to the top left, a row before last. Place on your mug and you are ready for some hot chocolate!

# Medicare Part D: Open Enrollment is Coming!

Last year over 9,000 Medicare recipients met with State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) counselors for assistance in Medicare A, B, C or D information. Do you know the difference? Medicare A primarily pays for a stay in the hospital, or a skilled nursing facility, B is for doctor's services and outpatient services such as lab tests, C pays for the Medicare Advantage or managed care alternative to traditional Medicare and D of course is the prescription drug plan. Soon Ocean County's Medicare beneficiaries will once again need to make a decision about their prescription drug coverage. Medicare Part D open enrollment period begins on October 15th and runs through December 7th. During this time, people with Medicare can sign up for a prescription drug plan or switch their current Medicare Part D plan in order to have the best coverage beginning January of 2019. And yes it's best to check each year for changes. Open enrollment is also the perfect time to review your Medicare Advantage plan with a SHIP Counselor to be notified of any changes. Our Senior Services Information and Assistance staff are certified State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP) counselors and there are additional counselors located throughout Ocean County. These counselors are available to help seniors and other Medicare beneficiaries with the annual drug plan enrollment process and answer any questions. For example, what if you cannot afford a Medicare Part D plan? There is federal assistance available for people with Medicare who have limited income and resources. If you qualify, you can receive assistance with premiums, deductibles and prescription co-payments. Please call 732-929-2091 or 1-800-668-4899 and ask to speak to one of our SHIP staff.

Ocean County Office of Senior Services will have representatives available for one-on-one assistance in comparing only the Medicare Prescription Drug Plans for 2019 on the Medicare Plan Finder. For an appointment, you must call the County Connection directly at 732-288-7777 to register. Registration is required.



# Willow Lake Boating Rules

- 9. No standing in boats.
- 10. No one shall go out in a boat alone.

### Leisure Village West Willows & Pines Golf Courses Regulations

For the enjoyment of the game of golf and for the proper care and maintenance of the golf courses the following regulations will apply.

Golf courses officially open at 8 a.m. from April to October unless otherwise posted. <u>*Players*</u> <u>must be 16 years of age</u>. Children and pets are not permitted anywhere on the golf course including sand traps and greens.

#### **General Rules:**

- 1. Residents and guests must wear appropriate badges. Residents must accompany guests.
- 2. Metal spike golf shoes are not allowed.

3. All players and guests must sign in for each 9 holes. No more than a foursome may play in a group. Tee off is in order of sign-in.

4. Each player must have a minimum of 2 clubs, one of which must be a putter.

5. All play begins on the first hole. Ball must be teed-up on all holes between the markers and no farther back than two club lengths.

6. The second hole tee box must be cleared of players before teeing off from the first tee on both courses. The ninth tee box at the Willows must be cleared of players before teeing off from the eighth tee.

7. Flag sticks and equipment must be kept off the greens.

8. <u>All players must replace divots, rake sand traps, and repair ball marks on the green</u>. Please repair you mark and one other, if necessary, to maintain the integrity of the course.

9. Out of Bounds: Areas outside the white markers and sidewalks are out of bounds. Place ball inbounds at a point where it left the fairway.

#### Please Note:

<u>Practice putting green</u>: A putter only is allowed. No chipping or pitching on to the green. <u>Tournaments</u>: Special rules are set forth by the tournament sponsors.




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# **Financial Information Club**



Autumn is approaching and I'm looking forward to photographing this year's fall foliage. The leaves should start changing in a few weeks – hopefully the colors this year will be spectacular.

Before the colors are at their peak I look for individual trees that have great color. I also scout out areas that I think will look great at peak time so I'll be ready when the leaves finally turn. I prefer areas that have the trees reflected in water.

Check out the farm markets for some colorful shots and don't forget the cranberry harvest. Fallen leaves make interesting patterns, so

don't forget to look down. Rolls of hay in the fields also make nice images.

A great way to enhance your images is using a polarizing filter. This filter works the same as polarizing sunglasses – it is designed to cut glare and reflections. Removing the glare from the leaves makes the colors brighter and more saturated. Simply rotate the polarizing filter until the sky or leaves are at their darkest.

Fall Foliage images are best shot on days when there is no wind. By scouting a great location ahead of time, using a polarizing filter, and applying good rules of composition you'll get some fantastic shots of





this autumn's spectacular show.

# **Fishing Club**

Have you ever caught a Houndfish? Houndfish are a game-fish that belong to the Belonid family. The beak looks almost like the jaw of a crocodile, that's why they are also called crocodile needlefish. Adults average around five feet in length and weigh around 10 pounds. The color of the sides is silver and the backside has green and blue shades. Houndfish do not have spines, instead they have soft rays.



They are generally found in tropical and subtropical regions, but this summer's heat wave brought them right up to the Manasquan inlet. They're found at the ocean surface and go as deep as 60 feet. They're generally spotted in small schools and have a tendency, at night, of jumping towards any light. This species is an egg laying fish. The outer surface of the eggs has tendrils that help it to stick to objects in the water.

Houndfish are a very popular game-fish, not listed among endangered species. However, keep in mind, they are considered dangerous as they tend to jump out from the water at a very high speed if they are frightened and can bite with their sharp teeth.

Here are some interesting facts about Houndfish. The largest Houndfish ever caught weighed 140 pounds was 64 inches long and 16 inches in width. Most people do not eat Houndfish as their bones are green in color. So, next time you're out, watch out for flying hounds.



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
