Board of Trustees Meeting – July 3, 2018

Present were S. Tozzi, C. Lupo, S. Falk-Zitelli, S. Kaufman, L. Maiocco and F. Weinstein. Also present were Community Manager J. Schultz, Service Manager J. Snyder, Accounting Administrator M. O'Connor and Recreation Manager Mary Lighthipe.

This meeting commenced at approximately at 1 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance.

S. Kaufman moved to waive the reading of the minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Falk-Zitelli moved to approve the June 20, 2018 corrected minutes. S.Kaufman seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo made a motion to memorialize the purchase of a Manitowoc Indigo ice machine, model IYT0450A, for Club Encore from Katom Restaurant Supply, Inc. for a total cost of \$2,986.57. This expense will be charged to GL#3150-Property Fund-Replacements. The unaudited balance for this account as of 5/31/18 is \$827,171.82. S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Kaufman made a motion to nominate Lou Maiocco as Vice President of the BOT for the remainder of the fiscal year. F. Weinstein seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Tozzi informed residents that the Board of Trustees has approved the appointment of Mr. Kevin Murphy to the Finance Division.

Mr. Tozzi wished the candidates running for the Board of Trustees well and introduced those who were present.

Community Manager's Report

Community Manager J. Schultz stated

that NJNG is making a last effort to bring gas into the Village. Residents along Huntington up to the Colonial gatehouse including Devonshire, Stamford, Finchley, Bosworth and Burtons Court will be getting marketing material soon. If they do not get enough people, they will probably give up on the Village. Residents are encouraged to go forward with it.

Community Manager J. Schultz reminded residents that we are under water restrictions. Watering is every other day based on your unit being odd or even, with no watering allowed from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and watering outside of those times for no longer than 30 minutes. No one should be washing cars. Use the least amount of water possible.

Community Manager J. Schultz informed residents that a subset of the Architectural Division was asked to look at the best way to handle the HVAC system at Club Encore. They met with different vendors and, at this time, they are proposing to go forward and purchase the units from and have the gas piping done by Toms River Heating and Cooling and have Curry Electric provide the electric for it. This expense is not to exceed \$240,000.00. It will be charged to GL#3230-Capital Replacement Common Buildings. Residents should have that in their package next time to discuss and hopefully move forward.

Service Manager J. Snyder updated residents on the Generator for Willow Hall. He is still waiting on a few quotes from plumbers and electricians. He is also working on the logistics and the permits. He is hoping to do the final reading at the July 18, 2018 meeting.

Mary Lighthipe gave the Recreation Report.

L. Maiocco moved to approve the July 3, 2018 minutes. C. Lupo seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

C. Lupo made a motion to authorize the Association to contract with the following vendors for the HVAC System Replacement-Club Encore: Toms River Heating & AC- HVAC-\$226,465.00, Toms River Heating & AC- Plumbing-\$3,250.00, Curry Electrical-Electrical-\$5,736.12, with additional costs for permits and demolition for a total cost not to exceed \$240,000.00. This expense will be charged to GL#3230-Capital Replacement-Common Buildings. The unaudited balance for GL#3230 as of 6/30/18 is \$1,307,396.98. S. Tozzi seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Falk-Zitelli made a motion to amend the By-Laws as proposed. S. Kaufman seconded. All present were in favor. Motion carried.

S. Kaufman informed residents that the Board of

Trustees has unanimously approved the appointment of Mr. Lawrence Buisa to the Architectural Committee.

S. Tozzi informed residents that after numerous emails and letters, the Board of Trustees has decided to suspend the pool monitors (gate guards) for two weekends beginning July 21, 2018 to determine if there are any incidents on the weekends and a decision on how to proceed from there will then be made.

Community Manager's Report

Community Manager J. Schultz reminded residents that unless they received a door hanger from Verizon, do not call Verizon. Please wait until you receive a door hanger to call Verizon.

Community Manager J. Schultz informed residents that a test was being performed for residents who have already had Verizon installed and no longer have the Community channel, to livestream the Board of Trustee meeting. This test was successful and the information to access the link will be on the creepers.

Community Manager J. Schultz informed residents that he is still waiting for the engineering results on the roofs of Encore, Willow Hall and Leisure Fair for Solar. Willow Hall and Leisure Fair will most likely need new roofs prior to solar installation.

Ping-Pong Club



The sport originated in Victorian England, where it was played among the upper class as an after dinner parlor game. It had several different names, including "Whiff-Whaff" and it has been suggested that makeshift versions of the game were developed by the British military officers in India or South Africa, who brought it back with them. A row of books stood up along the center of the table as a net, two more books served as rackets and were used to continuously hit a golf ball. The name Ping-Pong was in wide use before British manufacturer J. Jacques & Son Ltd. trademarked it in 1901. The name Ping-Pong then came to describe the game played using the rather expensive Jacques' equipment with other manufacturers calling it table tennis. A similar situation arose in the United States, where Jacques sold the rights to the Ping-Pong name to Parker Brothers. Parker Brothers then enforced this trademark for the term in the 1920s making various associations change their names to table-tennis instead of the more common, but trademarked term.

The next major innovation was James W. Gibb, a British enthusiast of table tennis, who discovered the novelty celluloid balls on a trip to the US in 1901 and found them ideal for the games. This was followed by E.C. Goode who, in 1901, invented the modern version of the racket by fixing a sheet of pimpled, or stippled rubber to the wooden blade. Table tennis was growing in popularity by 1901.

In 1921 the Table Tennis Association was



In the 1930s Edgar Snow commented that the Communist forces in the Chinese Civil War had a "passion for the English game of table tennis." Popularity of the sport waned in the 1930s Soviet Union.

In the 1950s paddles that used a rubber sheet combined with an underlying sponge layer changed the game dramatically, introducing greater spin and speeds. Table tennis was introduced as an Olympic sport in 1988.

Board Meetings at the Pool

Leisure Village West expands its accessibility to Board meetings for all residents. We've started streaming Board meetings so that residents can watch the meeting live, no matter where they are, at the pool, on the beach or anywhere else for that matter. Truthfully, we wanted to start this years ago, but with the dreadful bandwidth you have at home combined with the crippling internet unload speed at Willow, it wasn't worth the effort. Now, due to the earlier start date for Fios, we've had no choice but to start streaming out of necessity. Once Fios reaches Willow Hall, all constraints will subside, allowing for unfettered streaming of Board meetings and more.

Faster bandwidth holds the promise of even more work, communications and entertainment. We'll have to work out all the details to take full advantage of this newfound bandwidth, in the best interest of everyone, but no doubt we will.

How do you stream the Board meetings? Starting in YouTube just search for lvwa.livestream and it should take you right there. While you're there, hit the subscribe button to get alerts when a new broadcast is available. Also, from what I understand, we can get a custom URL when we hit 100 subscribers. I think this will wind up being the one place to store all of the Board meetings, but we'll see how that works out.

We have two Board meetings a month, open to members, broadcasted live on TV, available on demand and now live stream. I don't think there are many communities that can boast this degree of accessibility to matters relevant to your membership in the Association.

Community Channels

Hopefully, by the time you read this our community channels will be available on Fios. Your new bulk TV contract will include six community channels, up from the current three we previously enjoyed. Starting with channel 1970 moving through 1971, 1972, 1973, 1974 and 1975. They should also be available on your digital QAM TVs without a set top box, but channel locations may vary depending on TV manufacturers and models.

We'll still have a channel for Association news, the Club channel, and the front gate channel, but more will be added when they become available. I'm advocating for a Newcomers channel, to point our Greenhorn condominium owners and renters, first and foremost, welcoming them to our community, but also educating them on the intricacies and the nuances of condominium life, experienced here in our Village. I see this as especially useful for the most prominent problems or issues that ultimately is the root of concerns for the Association, you and your neighbors. KLVW has also expressed interest in having a channel for their broadcasts as well, freeing up the once crowded information on channel 12. Down the road a little, we'll see if we can augment the front gate channel, splitting the screen to show the other gates as well. Here's hoping this is old news by the time you've read this. and I've already made a OneCall heralding in the new channels. Wouldn't that be nice!

Revised and approved May 2, 2018. Supersedes all previous swimming pool rules.

The official opening is Friday, **May 25** for the Willow and Encore pools. Both the Willow and Encore pools will remain open until Sunday, **September 9** (weather permitting and subject to the availability of lifeguards).

NO SWIMMING UNLESS LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY

	Encore Pool	10 a.m. to 8 p.m. daily <i>Starting July 1:</i> <i>Extra swim hour, Encore pool will close at 9 p.m.</i>
	Aquacisers	10 to 11 a.m. Monday through Friday at Willow Pool Only (NO CLASSES on Holidays or Weekends)
	Lap Lanes	Residents must yield to lap lane swimmers
	Adult Guests	(Accompanied by a resident) Regular pool hours as listed above.
	Youth Guests	4 to 14 years of age (Accompanied by a resident) 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Encore Pool & Pool Area 4 to 7 p.m. at Willow Pool & Pool Area

Youth guests under 4 years of age are not permitted in either pool.

In the event of the closing of one pool; the youth guest hours are as follows at the opened pool: 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4 to 7 p.m. A 20-minute grace period will be allowed for children to exit the pool area at the end of the children's swim hours. Children are not allowed in the pool area at any time other than designated youth hours. Children 10 years of age and under must be accompanied by a parent or grandparent for the entire time they are in the water.

Badges: Members without guests must present their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the monitor stand before admittance to the pool area.

Members with guests must present their photo ID badge for verification of member status at the monitor stand. Members with guests will be required to sign in upon arrival and sign out upon departure. Member's guests will be issued a disposable wristband for the day. Guests must surrender their wristband before leaving the pool area for the day and may only return with a member.

Guests: Up to (4) adult or youth guests are permitted and MUST be accompanied by a RESIDENT who must REMAIN with guests and have the appropriate wristbands at all times.

- Attire: Proper swim attire must be worn from home to pool since changing area is limited. Cutoff jeans are not allowed in the pool. A cover-up wrap is needed when entering the clubhouses. The Association is not responsible for any discoloration of bathing suits due to pool chemicals. Street shoes are not allowed in the pool. Do not leave shoes or slippers at the pool steps.
- **Diapers:** Only diapers specially designed for immersion in water are permitted.
- **Safety:** No diving or jumping is allowed at either pool and will be strictly enforced. No sitting or standing on pool steps. Residents and guests may sit on steps where indicated at the Encore Pool. Weather related closures are at the discretion of the lifeguard. The lifeguard will determine when to reopen the pool. Lifeguards do remain on duty during rain.
- Swim Aids: No floats, toy surfboards or swim toys are permitted in the pool with the exception of noodles. Noodles are not to exceed two per person. Mesh seat noodles are also acceptable. Swimsuits that incorporate a flotation device as part of the suit construction are allowed. Swimmies are allowed. Residents are permitted to use therapeutic aquatic belts. Coast Guard approved life vests are also permitted.
- Health: Persons with open wounds are not permitted in either pool or Jacuzzi at any time. Lifeguards will enforce this rule.
- Food: Food and beverages are permitted in the pool area. No glass or other similar containers that might cause personal injuries if broken are permitted in the pool areas.
 No alcoholic beverages are permitted in the pool areas. Tables and surrounding area are to be left clean.
- **Smoking:** Neither smoking nor vaping are permitted within 25 feet of the pool area. Please use designated areas.

Lounges, Lounges, chairs or tables are not to be reserved with a towel, etc.


Chairs, When leaving the pool area chairs and lounges are to be returned to their Tables: proper places.

- **Showers:** Bathers are required to shower before entering the pools. If water shoes are worn please rinse before entering the pool.
- Jacuzzi: Residents are to read and follow rules posted at the Jacuzzi. No one under the age of 16 is allowed in the Jacuzzi.
- **Music:** Please use headphones where possible, otherwise be considerate and keep the volume down as not to disturb fellow members.

Willow Lake Boating Rules

Leisure Village West Association boats are available for use under the following conditions. Boats are available for use from **April 15 through October 15.**

- 1. Each boat must be restricted to four passengers, of which not more than two are adults.
- 2. Each boat occupant must wear a life jacket when in a boat. Life jackets are kept in the Gazebo on the pier.
- 3. Boats must be docked and entered from the shore line, not from the dock.
- 4. Boating is restricted to daylight hours.
- 5. Upon return, boats are to be pulled out of the water onto shore. Oars are to be placed inside

boat. Life jackets are to be returned to specified area of Gazebo.

- 6. Guests under 6 years of age are not permitted in the boats. Guests from 6 to 16 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.
- 7. All guests must be accompanied by a resident
- 8. No swimming or wading in any body of water other than the Village pools.
- 9. No standing in boats.
- 10. No one shall go out in a boat alone.

Leisure Village West Willows & Pines Golf Courses Regulations

For the enjoyment of the game of golf and for the proper care and maintenance of the golf courses the following regulations will apply.

Golf courses officially open at 8 a.m. from April to October unless otherwise posted. <u>*Players*</u> <u>must be 16 years of age</u>. Children and pets are not permitted anywhere on the golf course including sand traps and greens.

General Rules:

- 1. Residents and guests must wear appropriate badges. Residents must accompany guests.
- 2. Metal spike golf shoes are not allowed.

3. All players and guests must sign in for each 9 holes. No more than a foursome may play in a group. Tee off is in order of sign-in.

4. Each player must have a minimum of 2 clubs, one of which must be a putter.

5. All play begins on the first hole. Ball must be teed-up on all holes between the markers and no farther back than two club lengths.

6. The second hole tee box must be cleared of players before teeing off from the first tee on both courses. The ninth tee box at the Willows must be cleared of players before teeing off from the eighth tee.

7. Flag sticks and equipment must be kept off the greens.

8. <u>All players must replace divots, rake sand traps, and repair ball marks on the green</u>. Please repair you mark and one other, if necessary, to maintain the integrity of the course.

9. Out of Bounds: Areas outside the white markers and sidewalks are out of bounds. Place ball inbounds at a point where it left the fairway.





Here we strolled a 150 yard boardwalk slowly while experienced club members pointed out two species of wild orchids, carnivorous plants such as Sundews, Bladderworts, Pitcher Plants and the endangered and lovely Bog Asphodel, which

was first discovered in NJ. This walk was enjoyed by all and is certain to be on our field trip list again next summer.

On July 9, members enjoyed spectacular weather during our annual 2-hour guided boat tour of Barnegat Bay. We boarded our pontoon boat, skirted the coast of Cattus Island County Park in Toms River where we saw many Ospreys with young in their nests and then crossed the bay to view islands that host many nesting herons, egrets, ibises, gulls and terns. It

was a super day.

Some of our members just enjoy the monthly presentations, while others prefer field trips. We have ideas for new field trips for next year, so if you would enjoy being out in nature with your fellow residents, come to a meeting and ask about our trips.



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



Our next meeting is **September 12** at 7 p.m. in Club Encore. We will be discussing the final preparations for our annual event, Dog Day Afternoon.


