#### COMMUNITY MANAGER'S REPORT: (J. Snyder)

Trash collection for the Thanksgiving Day holiday was successful. There will be two dumpsters available near the Maintenance yard. Residents are reminded to only dump household garbage; no bulk items are permitted.

Holiday parking for visitors will be available for the Christmas holiday. Parking will be permitted overnight on the street for visitors with a permit from December 22 thru December 26. Residents may obtain a visitor parking permit beginning December 20.

There will be a Gate Guard at Route 37 for the following holidays; Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and Mother's Day. There were 156 guests that entered through the Route 37 gate on the Thanksgiving Day holiday.

The materials for the Bocce Courts and the Encore Structure have been ordered and work will continue on the projects.

Leaf pickup will continue and is a longer process than lawn cutting.

There was a PowerPoint Presentation regarding Power Outages. On December 1, Management met with three representatives from JCP&L to discuss the reoccurring power outages within the community. Being that our Power infrastructure is underground makes it more difficult to determine if an underground wire is failing. The Association has been told that in most cases, if they have a failed underground wire or a bad transformer, they are now replacing transformers and wires instead of just making a repair. Although this practice is good, it may lead to longer repair times. The Association has also been told that it is important that residents report the outage to JCP&L and not just rely on others to do so. If they just get a call or two about an outage, they may not know the extent of the outage. The more that call allows them to understand the scope of the outage. The larger the outage, the quicker the response. In the very near future, the smart meters will be able to alert JCP&L about the extent of the outages. JCP&L is hoping for approval from the BPU that will increase funding to JCP&L to allow them to upgrade failing infrastructures.

The Board is considering their position on allowing Whole House Generators. This has been sent to the Architectural Committee to research and report back to the Board for final decision.

There was no unfinished business.

#### NEW BUSINESS:

Revisions to Specification 3\_12, "To Install Back Door Awnings" was presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on January 3, 2024.

Revisions to Specification 3\_5, "To Install/Replace Storm Doors With or Without Retractable Screen" was presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on January 3, 2024.

Revisions to Specification 2\_1, "Portico Enclosures" was presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on January 3, 2024.

Specification 2\_10a, "Window Modification – Garden Window" was presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on January 3, 2024.

Specification 2\_10b, "Window Modification – Double Hung Windows" was presented as attached to the agenda. The Board will vote on this at the next open Board meeting on January 3, 2024.

The Terms and Conditions for the above Specifications will be redrafted and presented again at the next open Board meeting on January 3, 2024.

There will be a vacancy in the commercial space and the Board of Trustees will be doing a study to see if a convenience store will be feasible. Residents interested in the research may write a letter of interest to Association@lvwa.net.

The next open Board meeting will be held on Wednesday, January 3, 2024 at 1:00 PM in the auditorium at Willow Hall. The Audit meeting will be held on January 24, 2024 at 7:00 PM in the auditorium at Willow Hall.

There being no further business, the Board meeting adjourned at approximately 7:38 PM.

## Audience Comments - December 6, 2023

#### Willow Hall Auditorium

An open forum followed the business portion of the open Board meeting at 7:38 PM with residents raising questions or concerns or seeking clarification about a variety of issues. For exact content, please refer to FRONTSTEPS for the video recording of this meeting.

The Rules of Public Comment and Participation in the Open Forum were presented on the agenda.

<u>Resident:</u> Arthur Pedowitz from 1171B Thornbury Lane thanked and congratulated the Westernaires for an outstanding program last weekend to start off the Holiday season. He stated he had a power outage over the summer and believes it is because of the old Hotwire tower. He suggested they inspect the wiring underground by the tower.

<u>Response</u>: All Hotwire towers are gone; it may have been old Verizon phone lines. This will be brought to JCP&L's attention.

<u>Resident:</u> Melanie Letizia from 845C Winchester Court thanked Fay Weinstein and Jim Snyder for the day she lost her power, as they were kind enough to meet with the residents at Willow Hall and serve coffee and donuts, which was appreciated.

<u>Resident:</u> Joseph Ercolino from 1009B Buckingham Drive mentioned that it is worth attending the meetings for Coffee with the Board. He stated that the overflow parking lot at Club Encore is filled by 8:00 PM every night. He reported that one of the vehicles had not moved in two weeks. He asked if the Board will consider allowing residents to use the parking spaces closest to the pool on the off season.

<u>Response:</u> The Board will be discussing parking in the Village with ADR committee members at the Board workshop meeting on December 20. There are plans to add spaces in the overflow parking at Club Encore by the sheds.

<u>Resident:</u> Charlene Petrie from 471B Chelsea Court asked when the Verizon contract ends. She asked if they will be raising their rates.

<u>Response:</u> The Verizon contract ends October 2025. Verizon will not discuss terms of a new contract until October 2024. The Board does not know if they will raise their rates.

<u>Resident:</u> Rafaella Tutela from 684A Friar Court asked how many years is required to keep ballots after an election.

Response: Election material is kept for three years after an election.

<u>Resident:</u> Rosemary Licata from 468B Chelsea Court stated she does not like the allowed parking spaces on the circle by her unit. She reported that there has been a vehicle parked there for five days. She asked if the changed rule to allow parking spaces on the circles was checked to make sure it does not cause a public nuisance, which is against the law. She feels this devalues the properties.

The meeting ended at approximately 7:46 PM.





- Obesity

- Family History

Do you want to give your dog a fresh baked fun treat? Below is a 4-ingredient recipe you can make for your dog! You will need:

- 1 small overripe banana
  - 1/2 cup peanut butter
    - 1/3 cup chicken stock OR beef stock for beef flavor
      - 1 cup wheat flour
        - 1/2 cup of powdered brewer's yeast (optional for flea treatment)
- Preheat your oven to 350° and line a baking sheet with parchment paper.
- In a large mixing bowl, mash your banana.
- Now, add peanut butter, beef broth, and a 1/3 cup of flour at a time until well-mixed.
- Use a spatula to take all your dough out of your bowl and form into a large dough ball with your hands.

• Roll your dough out with a rolling pin and use a bone cookie cutter to cut out your bone-shaped dough, press your fork in the middle of the bones.

• Bake your bone dog biscuits on your parchment paper lined baking sheet for about 16-18 minutes, depending on how thick your dough is.

• Let cool and give one to your happy pup!

#### **Rare Birds in New Jersey**

One of the joys of birdwatching is finding or seeing a bird that is rare for your area. As of the summer of 2023, a total of 497 species have been reported over the years in NJ, and each year, the birding community expects one or two species to arrive that have never been seen previously in the State. 2023 has been no exception, especially near to us. In mid-November, a homeowner posted a photo on Facebook of a Limpkin in her Manasquan backyard, a first for the State. This is highly unusual, since Limpkins are a southern species of wading bird that feeds in wetlands, mostly on snails, and only strays occasionally, outside of Florida and the Gulf Coast. It is not so easy to find a Limpkin, even in Florida, so seeing one in a Monmouth County lawn in November is borderline ridiculous. After about three days, this bird was judged to be unhealthy and in need of help, so it was captured, brought to a rehab center, and released. Then, on December 5, things got really interesting when Harry Riker, a novice birder in Whiting, took a photo of a small bird with an iridescent blue tail in his backyard that he didn't recognize and asked others online what it might be. The response was shocking. He had found a Red-flanked Bluetail. Virtually every birder in NJ then asked "A Red-flanked WHAT?"



This species is so exotic and off-the-radar that most of us had never heard of it. It is normally found in Asia



westward to Finland, is extremely unusual for anywhere in North America, with a small handful of rare sightings in Alaska and the West Coast, and has never been seen in the U.S. east of a single record in Wyoming. Yet here it was; a lost bird in a yard five miles from Leisure Village West. As of this writing, birders are still flocking (yes, I unabashedly said that birders are flocking) to Harry's yard and neighborhood. On the day that I visited, there were folks from Nova Scotia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and North Carolina. Harry and his wife, Barbara, have been extraordinary hosts, even offering food to visitors, and neighbors that I met were friendly and delighted by their newly-found notoriety, despite hordes of visitors walking around their neighborhood with binoculars and cameras with long lenses.

The lesson from both of these examples is to keep your eyes open, take photos of anything that you see, and then ask for help. So, now we have 499 species seen in NJ. What will number 500 be, and who will be the lucky person to find it?
